I remember the inexpressible joy and pride when Ronn was able to chant the Four Questions for the first time — and the poignancy of that celebration

Michnik to Receive Shofar Award

Adam Michnik, outspoken and unyielding human rights activist for more than 25 of his 45 years, will receive the Eighth Annual **Shofar Award** from Central Synagogue at Shabbat Services on **Friday, April 19, 1991** at **8:15 pm.**

Mr. Michnik was a founder of Poland's Solidarity movement and a leading tactician of the nonviolent anti-totalitarian struggle. He was arrested many times — the first in 1965 — for his political beliefs, spending a total of six years as a political prisoner. He is now the editor-in-chief of *Gazeta Wyborcza*, the new independent daily in Poland, and an outspoken deputy in the Polish parliament.

In 1986 Edward Kennedy presented Mr. Michnik with the Robert Kennedy Human Rights Award. His other honors include: honorary doctoral degrees from The New School for Social Research and from the University of Minnesota; the French Pen Club Freedom Award; the Jurzykowski Prize; and many awards from Polish associations and institutions.

The Shofar Award is awarded for leader-ship on behalf of justice, equality, and commitment to the rights of the individual, in the finest tradition of Judaism and the Jewish people. Previous honorees are Jacob K. Javits (1984), Norman Lear (1985), Louise Nevelson (1986), Dr. Mathilde Krim (1987), Eugene M. Lang (1988), Isaac & Vera Stern (1989), and Jonathon Kozol (1990).

I am part of a class of young women who will soon be the intelligent and active participants in a new generation of Jewish women leaders. I am aware of the significance of my religion, and understand the importance of feeling comfortable with it. Yet, I feel part of my womanhood is my religion, but my religion is not fully part of my womanhood. Judaism does not fully quench my thirst for defining myself, as it deals with the male gender on an intimate scale, and views the needs of the female as secondary.

The basis of Judaism itself was barely touched by a woman's input, as its contents were written mostly by men. It therefore constitutes mainly male ideals and emotions. Originally, the restrictions placed on women were caused by the deep-seated belief that women could only belong to a familial class. In the present day, women are seen in a fresh and renewed light. Women's opportunities are growing, and our abilities are more widely recognized. In many ways Judaism has tried to enlarge its scope, so as to include many of these new outlooks. Still, too many women who are growing up with these modern and innovative ideas surrounding them feel alienated by Judaism.

At times I feel unwanted when I pray at Temple. When I read the liturgy, and truly try to understand the traditional words, I see a God portrayed almost exclusively in male personifications. When the Hebrews made their exodus from Egypt, and God promised them freedom from their bondage, he promised it to Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. How can a woman give true allegiance to a heritage of fathers and sons?

As the segregation between the sexes grows hazier, women will be less tolerant of a religion that does not deal with their needs. Hopefully our religion will understand the importance of evolution, and will allow itself to continue modernizing. I love my religion; I could not feel this strong an attachment if Judaism lacked all the qualities I need for individual survival. But, I believe an institution as great as ours must be able to include all types in its congregations, and must have a God that everybody can identify with.

Now more than ever it is important for us to effectively and supportively reach out to our students.

The College Committee (Carol Cohen, Gina Genel, Linda Lynn) and I have worked very hard this year to expand our college program. We continue sending students a menorah and boxes of Passover candy.

This year, thanks to the Brotherhood, I will

visit college students in Philadelphia, Boston, Providence, Poughkeepsie, Washington, D.C., New Haven and right here in the city. This ongoing contact is more crucial — and more satisfying — than ever.

Social Action Committee:

Report on Homelessness Project

During the year 1989-90, in honor of the sesquicentennial observation of the founding of Central Synagogue, the Social Action Committee sponsored a special program to prevent families on the verge of being exicted from their apartments retain them. This was a cooperative effort of the subcommittee on housing of the Social Action Committee and the Legal Aid Society.

The Legal Aid Society had found that tenants were being evicted who had temporary financial difficulties, and who could normally handle their problems. If they received one-time assistance, eviction could be avoided and the consequent increase in the number of homeless families could be reduced. A request for funds was made to members of the synagogue, and a generous response resulted. A total of \$11,336 was raised, including \$2,000 from Brotherhood.

The Legal Aid Society, through Helaine Barnett, attorney in charge, set up criteria for determining how help was to be allocated and was most judicious in its use of funds, exploring all avenues of assistance before making a grant. In one case, help had been extended to a family that was able to handle the payment later, reimbursing the fund for the money it advanced.

The fund has now been exhausted, and the Legal Aid Society has reported on its expenditures. The fund saved from homelessness twenty-five families, consisting of about ninety people. The smallest individual outlay was \$83.40, and the greatest \$1,016. The Legal Aid Society has expressed its gratitude for our help in this worthwhile effort. The Social Action Committee wishes once again to thank those members of the synagogue who contributed to this project.

Central Synagogue & NYANA Work Together

Central Synagogue has joined hands with NYANA (New York Association for New Americans) in a pilot program to help find jobs for newly resettled Soviet Jews. when Aviva, our youngest, took over the task from Shoshana—and declared that the job was hers by right until the grandchildren came on the scene.

I remember Soviet Jews who have joined us over the years, bridging the gap between ancient liberation and contemporary dreams. making the Haggadah text overflow with urgency. I remember tears of happiness when my father was able to be with us: he always has the right to read the only passage in Yiddish found in our Reform Haggadah. And I remember my in-laws, pushing me on to complete the Seder before dawn would break, challenging miracle stories other than those which emerged out of the decisions and deeds of human beings. I remember that special warmth which flowed through the room those years when a very special friend, a Black minister in Worcester, shared with us his impressions of the struggle for freedom as together we 'proclaimed: Ha Lachma Anya - Behold, this is the bread of affliction . . . Let all who are hungry come and eat." And I remember the Trappist monk, a lover of Jewish medieval studies, who annually received permission from his order to join us in sacred celebration.

I remember the time when our children prepared an effigy of Elijah, hanging him from the portico above our front door. On cue, a young cousin thrust open that door, expecting nothing but the image of a full moon on a crisply dark night. There was an encounter with the supernatural at that moment which will live forever in our family annals. And, of course, the scramble for the Afikoman, an event which brought rewards to all of the participants, no matter what their age. Not every piece of that middle Matzoh would be discovered each year, leading to certain other rather unnecessary concerns at a later date.

There are memories of friends who felt that, by joining us, they were extending the embrace of their own family circles; memories of college students, unable to return to their own homes, bringing their particular stories and concerns and struggles to our midst. And, of course, memories of those wondrous matzoh balls — which were never too hard, never too soft. Truly a Passover miracle! We would sing and debate, eat more than was necessary, empty our four cups, and finally reach for those incredible double almonds from Bartons which alone could properly mark the close of yet another Seder.

A new Seder now awaits us, a new time to bring the family together, to share with friends both old and new. May the memories each of us will gather this year be good memories. As we look around and note seats which will never again be filled, may we also have the joy of seeing new seats occupied by those whom we have come to love and embrace. As we read "freedom's wondrous story," may we be strengthened in our resolve to share our gifts with all who come seeking.
