In fact it was all I could do to keep from crying myself. I was nearly swamped by handshakes and questions from everybody.'

"Here speaks the authentic voice of Israel—the voice of prayer, of individual prayer, and of congregational prayer. It is for us who have so many opportunities for prayer, and frequently so little fervor in its utterance, to gain a new appreciation of Israel's prayers in the knowledge that they have sustained the tragic victims of persecution and war. For them, despite all tribulations, it has averted the 'evil decree' of spiritual destruction."

RE-OPENING A SYNAGOGUE

The son of a Rodeph Sholemite has written: "Folks, I had one of the greatest thrills of my life about ten days ago. I instigated and was present in a small town in France at the opening of the local synagogue. It was the first time in fourand a half years that those Jewish people had a public Service, and the first time in that period that the Torah was taken out of its hiding place. The tears of joy and the local reaction left such a feeling of satisfaction in my heart that I, one of many, had helped to preserve the areat tradition which is ours. We had about 25 G.I's at the Service, and we made a little collection for the Shuhl. We gave them a good sum in cash, and they couldn't express their thanks."

SUNDAY MORNING SERVICES NOVEMBER 4th

Sunday Morning Services begin November 4th, at 10:45 for the sixteenth consecutive year It is anticipated that in addition to discourses by the Rabbi on themes of vital religious, cultural, literary and sociological interests, a distinguished group of guest preachers and speakers will come to us. There will be, as usual, a frequent opportunity for written questions from the Congregation following the discourse.

RECOVERING OUR SCROLLS

"The recovery of 250 Scrolls of the Law in a cellar of Europe is a symbol of the recovery of Europe of the Judaeo-Christian message. Out of the very depths our Holy Law has been rescued, and now it will be enshrined again in our Arks of the Covenant. Again our fellow-Jews will clasp the sacred parchments in their arms at this Festival of the Rejoicing of the Law, and again they will exult that our Bible has outlived its defamers and its maligners, as it has done throughout the ages. Those who trample upon the letters of Holy Writ, and those who mock at their message will find that the letters are aflame with the Divine Fire that consumes all unrighteousness. The Nazis may have burned the synagogues of Europe, but they could not destroy the religion of Israel. Jesus of Nazareth in spirit, as the story-teller narrates, has made the tenth member at many a prayerguorum for the recitation of the Kaddish at the grave of a slain soldier or martyr. Judaism cannot die because it is the eternal faith of the eternal people, and because, also, it is imbedded in the religion of Christendom and Islam. Therefore we look to the majority peoples of the Occident and the Orient to do justice to the Jew: to recompense Israel for non-Jewish indebtedness to Israel's Law by permitting Jewry to rebuild its ancient Homeland in Palestine. The Simhat Torah Festival this year has an especial meaning for us all, since the events of the past months have been so joyous and so heartening. Let us be worthy of the moral inspiration of the Mosaic teachings, and recreate society in terms of the ideals it has imparted to mankind. America and all the free nations can truly rise to their greatest spiritual strength if they but heed the instruction of the Judaeo-Christian tradition, embodied in the Scrolls of the Torah."

RESTORING A CEMETERY

A Staff Sergeant, a Confirmant of Congregation Rodeph Sholom has written from Germany in a letter of August 9th the following item: "I have under my orders 18 men who were imprisoned for the complete desecration of the local Jewish cemetery. I added to them a detail of 50 political prisoners and ordered them under guard to resurrect and beautify the cemetery so that it will be better than any in the whole world. Work began two days ago. I checked up today. Oh, boy, you should see them working, guarded by an infantry Joe, a Jewish native of K..... whose grandfather's grave was ripped wide open, and the tomb above smashed. So I am satisfied that I have been given the chance to make my stay here constructive."

PRAYER THAT SAVES (From the Sermon: "Repentance, Prayer and Charity")

"And it is prayer, organized prayer, that helps avert the 'evil decree.' I have been shown a letter from Czechoslovakia by a metropolitan Jewish soldier boy which tells of Divine Services which he organized for 300 survivors of local concentration camps. When a couple of the boy's buddies passed out Siddurim the men looked at the books unbelieving, and when they began to turn the pages, their faces lit up. Some of the older women began to cry. 'It was a sight to be witnessed before understood. I started to sing Nishmas', writes the soldier boy,' and there wasn't a sound heard in the room. Finally when my friends joined in, the entire congregation began to sing. Slowly but surely they were gaining confidence. By the time I was singing Shokhein Ad, every voice was singing along. I explained the fact that we hadn't any Torah or Humashim, and an old man sprang up with a torn and tattered book. He had made a calendar of the Parshas,
