FROM THE RABBI'S STUDY

RABBI DAVID A. LIPPER

his month, I have given serious thought

to the nature of our world and our responsibility for it. In Torah study, we have had a series of conversations on the deeper issues that affect us as Jews living in the 21st century. I have taken the liberty to reprint some parts of a message written by Rabbi Marla Feldman on advocacy. Please read this message and join me in advocating for the repair of our broken world.

WHY ADVOCACY IS CENTRAL TO REFORM JUDAISM

"Reform Jews are committed to social justice. Even as Reform Jews embrace ritual, prayer, and ceremony more than ever, we continue to see social justice as the jewel in the Reform Jewish crown. Like the prophets, we never forget that God is concerned about the everyday and that the blights of society take precedence over the mysteries of heaven. A Reform synagogue that does not alleviate the anguish of the suffering is a contradiction in terms." --Rabbi Eric Yoffie (continued on page 2)

To be a Reform Jew is to hear the voice of the prophets in our head; to be engaged in the ongoing work of *tikkun olam*; to strive to improve the world in which we live. The passion for social justice is reflected in the ancient words of our prophets and sages and in the declarations of our Movement's leaders throughout its history. The ancient command *"Tzedek, Tzedek Tirdof!* Justice, justice shall you seek!" constantly reverberates in our ears. It has become deeply embedded in the Reform Jewish psyche.

The idea that people of faith have a mandate to bring their values into the public arena is not unique to the Reform Movement. There is a long tradition of faith groups "speaking truth to power" and advocating for social change, and every major religious organization in American life participates in this civic exercise. Religious voices have been central in the major social justice movements throughout our nation's history, from the abolitionist movement to those involved with desegregation and civil rights. In the international arena as well, faith groups have led the way in advocating for nuclear disarmament, international aid and human rights around the world.

We are challenged by an overwhelming number of issues, each one central to our understanding of the prophetic message of our faith and critical to creating the kind of society we wish to bequeath to those who follow us. And not only are we overwhelmed by the sheer scope of the issues that are before us, but we are confronted by those who claim to speak in the name of faith, but who offer a different version of what God expects of us, those who proclaim themselves the upholders of family values yet who do not value individual rights or personal autonomy, and who have little respect for the Constitutional principles that have allowed religion to thrive in this country unfettered by government coercion or corruption. If we don't bring progressive religious values into the public arena with us, we will abandon

the public square to those offering a different view of religion and values which do not always include us.

In 1999, the Central Conference of American Rabbis also affirmed the following statement. We bring Torah into the world when we strive to fulfill the highest ethical mandates in our relationships with others and with all of God's creation. Partners with God in tikkun olam, repairing the world, we are called to help bring nearer the messianic age. We seek dialogue and joint action with people of other faiths in the hope that together we can bring peace, freedom and justice to our world. We are obligated to pursue tzedek, justice and righteousness, and to narrow the gap between the affluent and the poor, to act against discrimination and oppression, to pursue peace, to welcome the stranger, to protect the earth's biodiversity and natural resources, and to redeem those in physical, economic and spiritual bondage. In so doing, we reaffirm social action and social justice as a central (continued on page 3)

Social Action Committee Fulfills Wish List for Children's Hospital Program

A few months ago, the Summit County Children Who Witness Violence Program (CWWV) at Akron Children's Hospital provided the speaker for a Social Action Committee meeting. The committee was so moved by what it heard about CWWV that it asked to see the group's "wish list" and promised to provide some of the items on the list. CWWV, a grant-funded program, provides crisis intervention services for children from 0-17 who have witnessed violence or some kind of trauma.

On June 27, Michelle Stein and De Friedman presented the wish list items to the CWWV staff. Many people on the committee participated in gathering items, but Michelle Stein did most of the shopping and was very excited to be present to make the presentation. Most of the wishes were fulfilled as the CWWV staff accepted five portable CD players, a digital camera, Play-Doh, journals and gel pens, stuffed animals of all kinds, and a variety of art supplies for the children who are in trauma.

The Social Action Committee was most gracious in bestowing these gifts, and the staff and clients of the Children Who Witness Violence Program are grateful to receive such generous gifts.

Brian Sugerman, son of Beth (Sisterhood president) and Irv, was a member of the US Soccer Team at the recent Maccabi Games in Australia. Here is part of an e-mail he sent while there.

Today we played the almighty Argentinians. This was a tense and great game. They are undefeated and with a win we would have secured our spot in the final gold medal game. After a seesaw battle which got very heated at times, they prevailed and won 2-I. It was our best game yet. With a win against the Australians tomorrow, we go to the gold medal game anyway.

This is a once in a lifetime experience, and I am having the time of my life. I have met so many amazing people from all over the world. I want to share one of my most memorable moments to date. For the opening ceremonies, which were held at the Sydney Opera House, all the countries lined up and did the march around the House. Once inside, each country sat in reserved sections, and we saw the pride of each country. The Argentinians, Mexicans and Israelis were all singing, hooting and hollering, having an amazing time. I got chills when over 200 of our athletes and our supporters in the seating area stood, removed their caps and sang our National Anthem. This single moment made me realize this entire trip was worth the money and the training, and I was in a room representing my country, doing what I love to do!

We got the opportunity to watch Tower 14 at Olympic Park be dedicated to honor the Munich II, the Jewish athletes killed at the Munich Olympics. After the ceremony we went to the Olympic Cauldron and watched it be lit for the first time for a non-Olympic organization, and stood around in a circle singing Jewish songs, as loud and as proud as we possibly could. Truly a touching experience.


