our hearts and souls with the powerful spirit of change that they bring each year. Change is difficult for most of us. But change and adapt we must if we are to grow in our relationship with God.

Here is a story to prepare you for the upcoming Holy Days.

THE RABBI

A man is driving down the road and his car breaks down near a yeshiva. He goes to the yeshiva, knocks on the door, and says, "My car broke down. Do you think I could stay the night?" The Rabbis graciously accept him, feed him dinner, even fix his car.

As the man tries to fall asleep, he hears a strange sound. A sound not like anything he's ever heard before. The Sirens that nearly seduced Odysseus into crashing his ship come to his mind. He doesn't sleep that night. He tosses and turns, trying to figure out what could possibly be making such a seductive sound.

The next morning, he asks the Rabbis what the sound was, but they say, "We can't tell you. You're not a Rabbi." Distraught, the man is forced to leave.

Years later, after never being able to forget that sound, the man goes back to the yeshiva and pleads for the answer again. The Rabbis reply, "We can't tell you. You're not a Rabbi." The man says, "If the only way I can find out what is making that beautiful sound is to become a Rabbi, then please, make me a Rabbi."

The Rabbis reply, "You must travel the earth and tell us how many blades of grass there are and the exact number of grains of sand. When you find these answers, you will have become a Rabbi."

The man sets about his task. After years of searching he returns as a gray-haired old man and knocks on the door of the yeshiva. A Rabbi answers. He is taken before a gathering of all the Rabbis. "In my quest to find what makes that beautiful sound, I traveled the earth and have

found what you asked for: By design, the world is in a state of perpetual change. Only God knows what you ask. All a man can know is himself, and only then if he is honest and reflective and willing to strip away self deception."

The Rabbis reply, "Congratulations. You have become a Rabbi. We shall now show you the way to the mystery of the sacred sound." The Rabbis lead the man to a wooden door, where the head Rabbi says, "The sound is beyond that door." The Rabbis give him the key, and he opens the door. Behind the wooden door is another door made of stone. The man is given the key to the stone door and he opens it, only to find a door made of ruby. And so it goes that he needs keys to doors of emerald, pearl and diamond. Finally, they come to a door made of solid gold. The sound has become very clear and definite. The Rabbis say, "This is the last key to the last door."

The man is apprehensive to no end. His life's wish is behind that door! With trembling hands, he unlocks the door, turns the knob, and slowly pushes the door open. Falling to his knees, he is utterly amazed to discover the source of that haunting and seductive sound.

But I can't tell you what it is because you're not a Rabbi!

The month leading up to the Holy Days is a month of preparation. We are to search and journey in our own soul for inner peace and tranquility. The sounds that we hear are the haunting melodies of Avinu Malkeinu and Kol Nidre, the sound of the Shofar and the splash of bread crumbs on the waters at Tashlich. These are the sounds for which we search and their melody is imprinted in our heart.

May this Holy Day season be a season of joy and a time in which you can hear the melody of wholeness and peace.

Temple Israel Guest Policy For the High Holy Days

(Approved by the Board of Trustees, May 14, 2002 and re-confirmed August 9, 2005)

- Paid-up members of Reform congregations, upon request by letter or fax from their congregation, will receive a reciprocal ticket.
- Paid-up members of any local or out-of-town congregation are welcome as guests upon advance request.
- Non-resident guests of members of Temple Israel, including children over the age of 26, who are not members of another congregation, will be charged \$50 per person for Rosh Hashanah services and \$50 per person for Yom Kippur services. If payment is not made in advance, the amount will be billed to the congregant.
- Local non-affiliated residents over the age of 26 can purchase guest admission for \$350 per family unit for High Holy Day services, or \$100 per person for Rosh Hashanah and \$100 per person for Yom Kippur. (Exceptions can be made, in extenuating circumstances, subject to the review of the Dues/Membership Committee.) No benefits of membership will be included with guest admission. If the resident wishes to become a member of the congregation after attending High Holy Day services, the amount paid will be credited to dues.
- Full-time students, with advance request and proper identification will be admitted at no charge.

No one is ever denied admission to services because of financial hardship. Any request for an exception to the above guidelines will be reviewed confidentially by the Dues/Membership Committee.

Because of security concerns, every adult attending High Holy Day services will be <u>required</u> to have a photo I.D. in addition to a Temple Israel membership card or guest ticket.

WERBER'S WISDOM

RABBI LAUREN WERBER

went snake wrangling last month. I was in North Carolina on vacation when my cousin Jim commented that women can't snake wrangle. I then told him that I would see him in the morning for the excursion. The next day, amidst promises that I would glean a sermon from the experience, I met with Jim and two other male cousins for our snake wrangling adventure. We headed down the Cape Fear River on a small boat, searching for snakes. When we spotted one, one of us would get out of the boat, quietly approach the snake, grab it, return it to the boat, and put it in a canvas bag. I actually successfully wrangled a snake, bare-handed, without getting bitten! We brought the snakes back to our beach house where the children played with them, and then we returned them to the wild.

Jim was correct, and I did glean a sermon (as well as this newsletter article) from the experience. I came home questioning the ethics of snatching snakes, but also inspired. "I have a sermon," I said. "My sermon is Jim. Jim sees stuff." As he was driving us to the river, Jim stopped the car to show us an albino deer as well as wild turkeys that he had spotted. He was also the one to spot turtles, vultures, a bear, and every snake we saw that day. Jim even shared bits of history that he could see in old shacks and shanties along the way. Throughout our adventure, Jim reminded me of a lesson learned from the story of our patriarch, Jacob. Jacob wrestles with an angel by the River of Peniel, emerges victorious, and proclaims, "Yesh Adonai bamakom hazeh, God was in this place, but I, I did not know."

We all walk the same paths through life. We live under the same sun, among the same plants and trees and animals. Some of us see nothing marvelous or miraculous. Others, like Jim, see the albino deer and wild turkeys and bears. Some of us, like Jim, know yesh Adonai bamakom bazeh, God is in this place.

The majesty of autumn is descending upon us. If we pay attention, if we look, we can see some of what my cousin sees every day. We can find God in this place: in the marvels of nature, in the beauty of friendship, in the eyes of children, in the wisdom of age. From snake wrangling and from Jim I have learned, "Yesh Adonai bamakom hazeh." May we all see God in this place.

Alan Dershowitz is a professor at Harvard Law School, frequent author and syndicated columnist. In the courtroom, he has defended Anatoly Sharansky, O.J. Simpson and Michael Milken, among many others. In 1983, the Anti-Defamation League of the B'nai B'rith presented him with the William O. Douglas First Amendment Award for his compassionate eloquent leadership and persistent advocacy in

the struggle for civil and human rights." In presenting the award, Nobel Laureate Elie Wiesel said: "If there had been a few people like Alan Dershowitz during the 1930s and 1940s, the history of European Jewry might have been different."

Jim Wallis is a speaker, author, activist, and international commentator on ethics and public life. He is the founder/Executive Director of Sojourners—Christians for Justice and Peace and initiated Call to Renewal, a national federation of churches and faith-based organizations to overcome poverty. Mr. Wallis speaks at more than 200 events a year and his columns appear in the New York Times, Washington Post, Los

Angeles Times, and other major newspapers. His most recent book is God's Politics: Why the Right Gets It Wrong and the Left Doesn't Get It (Harper Collins, 2005).



Rabbi Harold Kushner has helped people throughout the world with his writings, including Living a Life that Matters and Overcoming Life's Disappointments. Rabbi Emeritus of Temple Israel in Natick MA, his international bestseller, When Bad Things Happen to Good People, has been translated into fourteen languages. He holds six honorary degrees and

has received numerous distinguishing awards, including the Christopher Medal and The Yitzhak Rabin Award. In 1995, he was honored as one of 50 people who have made the world a better place in the past 50 years.


