It is difficult to write on any subject in which the congregation has not participated. I have greater difficulty writing on a subject that is unfamiliar. This month will be the exception! I feel obligated to inform you of my trip in early November to Erie, Pennsylvania, to attend the 2006 Regional Biennial of the Union for Reform Judaism. Last year, a record number of Temple Israel participants and I attended the National Biennial in Houston, and in December 2007, I will go to the National Biennial in San Diego. I hope that you will consider joining us at such a special convention.

So why share with you something that really does not directly affect Temple Israel in Akron, Ohio? It is because these conventions do directly affect us. These conventions reinforce that we all share very similar issues while attempting to support our individual synagogues valuing Jewish practices. There are workshops that are available for many topics pertinent to Reform Judaism. The participation of the attendees brings lasting intellectual and spiritual growth. Scott Jaffe, Rabbi Lipper and I not only attended but also were presenters at a workshop. We will work harder to engage more congregants to attend in the future.

Workshops at the last regional Biennial were broken down into five areas. (1) Outreach and Sacred Community, including supporting conversion, creating a culture of leadership, supporting interfaith families, and synagogue. (2) Youth and Lifelong Jewish Learning with programs such as keeping youth involved in Jewish experiences. (3) Synagogue Management, including managing change, changing your synagogue space for the 21st century, fundraising, and measuring the success of your programs. (4) Worship and Music such as re-invigorating Shabbat worship. (5) Social Justice, including social action for the masses, and the importance of social action to Israel. In addition to workshops, you have the opportunity to worship, form friendships, and eat (yes, we love to eat) with Jews from synagogues everywhere. The entertainment was exceptional, and we were treated to singer/songwriter Debbie Friedman.

The Regional and National Biennials give us all the opportunity to grow our individual synagogues, while feeling proud to be Jewish. I urge you to consider attending one of these in the future. The excitement of sharing and giving will be an exceptional experience. Please contact me to learn how to be part the 2007 National Biennial.

Each chapter within Hadassah's 4-state Central States region was encouraged to honor a member of the chapter with the *Women of Innovation Award*. Audrey Baker and Cheryl Carter, Akron Chapter Hadassah's co-presidents, nominated **Barbara (Bobby)**



Adler. The awards were presented at the Fall Conference, which was held Oct. 20-22 in Cincinnati.

Bobby organized and implemented an extremely successful Stem Cell Research program last April. With over 150 attendees, the event made local press and aired on local cable twice. Her commitment to the program was based on her personal quest to find a cure for a rare blinding disease afflicting her own young granddaughter.

The stem cell research event included a highpowered panel with State Senator Eric Fingerhut, Rabbi Lauren Werber, Cleveland Clinic cardiologist and researcher Dr. Mark Penn, and National Hadassah moderator Karen Venezky. The event made Akron Hadassah stand out as a community leader. Ninety-eight letters supporting embryonic stem cell research were later faxed to Congress.

The event wasn't meant to be a fundraiser, but Bobby organized 3 grants which defrayed most expenses, received a \$1,000 donation from a special donor, and had several dozen Chai sponsors. With so many attendees, Akron Hadassah was able to send a research contribution to Hadassah's Goldyne Savad Institute for Gene Therapy in Jerusalem.

An Opportunity to Give

A new law, the Pension Protection Act of 2006, will make it easier for congregants to make a significant financial contribution to the Temple. The new law is in effect only for 2006 and 2007, and allows tax-free withdrawals directed to charities directed from Individual Retirement Accounts—IRAs.

The law allows donors older than 70½ to distribute up to \$100,000 per year to qualified charities, such as Temple Israel. Distributions are tax free, but donors will not be entitled to a charitable income tax deduction for their gift. Also, the distribution must be made directly from the Trustee of an IRA to the Temple or the Temple Foundation.

Please check with your IRA Trustee or professional advisor for further information on how to distribute your gift. But do consider taking advantage of tax free donations to the Temple from your IRA this year and next.

Latkes for Chanukah

3 large potatoes I teaspoon salt I small onion Pinch of pepper 2 beaten eggs ½ cup vegetable oil 2 tablespoons matzah meal



Wash the potatoes well, but you don't have to peel them. They are healthier and easier to prepare unpeeled. Grate them coarsely into a bowl. Grate in the onion, using a food processor if you have one. Add the salt and pepper, eggs and matzah meal. Let the mixture sit for 10 minutes to thicken. Pour off the excess liquid.

Heat the oil for one minute in a frying pan. Gently drop the mixture into the pan, making each latke two inches across. When the latkes are brown around the edges, turn them and fry them on the other side until crispy. Drain on paper towels. Eat them with applesauce, sour cream or cinnamon and sugar. Makes about two dozen latkes.

WERBER'S WISDOM

RABBI LAUREN WERBER

I've learned a lot in the past weeks. After breaking my ankle in mid-October, I've learned that crutches are much harder to use than they were when I was a child. I've learned that the hardest part is holding a door open and getting through it on my own. I've learned that I can't carry anything in my hands while on crutches. I can reach the refrigerator but I cannot carry the food, I can buy anything I want but I cannot get it into the car, and I can play with my children but I cannot put the toys away.

I've also learned that I still can do a lot. I can hop down stairs, I can retrieve all kinds of things with an outstretched crutch, I can brush my hair while standing on one foot, I can sleep with a cast on my foot, and I can ask for help when I need it.

I've learned that pride and vanity are silly things. I've learned that it is better to ask for a drink than to be thirsty, better to ask for an arm than to fall down, better to wear an unattractive tennis shoe than to hurt the other foot as well. I've learned that, if I use a wheelchair, I can get out more and enjoy more activities. I've learned that people are laughing with me but not at me, and that there is no shame in being injured or disabled. I've even learned that I can enjoy life just as much as I did before. I've learned that a broken ankle is quite an inconvenience, but I've also learned that it would be a whole lot worse without crutches. My fancy aluminum crutches help me to get around, but the far more important crutches of family, friends, and community help me stand up, cope, and laugh at my situation. I've learned that many, many people live the value of bikkur cholim - of visiting the sick and needy - and that their concern really does help.

I've learned that there is love and support all around, that too often we underestimate the strength of our community and the power of the crutches who hold us up. I've learned that well-wishes, cards, thoughts and prayers work, and I've learned that people are ready to help.

Family members, congregants, friends, even casual acquaintances have been there for me. My parents are caring for the baby, my husband is picking up after me constantly, and my children are learning to pitch in. Neighbors and friends are driving the children to school, cooking for my family, and checking in again and again. My wonderful Adult B'nai Mitzvah class even delivered enough food to my house to feed us until I am cooking again! Strangers hold doors, offer to reach things, and help me to shop. I've learned that people care and we are never really alone.

I've learned to appreciate the ability to walk and the challenges of a disability and I await a *refuab sh'leimab* – a complete healing of my body – but I am not impatient. I have learned to be grateful, not only for health, but for community and for kindness. I am grateful for all the goodness I have witnessed and all the lessons I have learned.
