Despite our nation's prosperity, hunger still remains a scandal. More than 35 million Americans, including 12 million children, are hungry or at the very edge of hunger, unsure of where their next meal will come from.

Here is a special reading that I hope that you will use in your seder. Remember what we teach, that until all are free, none are free.

Why is this night different from all others? This night we celebrate liberty, not just for us but for all people. This night will be different because it must be different, for we are free, but the world is not yet whole.

So we gather this night to offer hope for the future. In nights to come, may those who are hungry and homeless join us at our table. And we say,

LET ALL WHO ARE HUNGRY ENTER AND EAT.

Why is this night different from all others? This night we pledge to fight hunger, for our tradition - and our freedom - demand it.







Soon after I became the Cantorial Soloist at Temple Israel in 2001, the Congregational Choir took form. In the beginning, the choir was a timid group, finding its way through Jewish prayers and learning to meld as a group.

That first service, sitting on the Bima, singing with the congregants looking at the choir members, was a scary step which blossomed into a cohesive unit through the years.

As time progressed, the Congregational Choir became an assured group of singers. The Wednesday evening rehearsals had positive results:

\*The members sang once a month at services, presenting contemporary music.

\*The Choir enhanced the Afternoon Service on Yom Kippur.

\*The Reform Movement's history through music was presented at special Shabbat services.

\*The Congregational Choir made two appearances at the Jewish Festival.

\*The Choir (now known as Kol Zimrah) was a hit at Chambrel, delighting the residents.

The only problem we experienced was how to file all the music we had been learning. Finally, a solution was found: 3-inch binders with alphabetical dividers. Would you believe that our hundreds of pieces of music are all alphabetized?

Instead of a weekly commitment, we can choose an event or a service that works within the confines of our busy lives and just rehearse for a few weeks for that particular event. 
