FROM THE PRESIDENT

YOM KIPPUR 2007/5768

The High Holidays remind me of an interesting parallel, particularly when viewing the importance of Yom Kippur. The late Charles Schulz prepared a Peanuts cartoon showing the demanding Lucy handing out lists to all of her friends, telling them all of their faults and imperfections. When Charlie Brown challenges Lucy, asking why she has the right to do this, she replies, "I want to make this a better world for me to live in."

This cartoon talks volumes. The lesson obviously is so simple. We live in a "me" society—a society where it becomes much easier to live a life concentrating on making "our" world a better place, as opposed to making it better for others. We must take the time to listen and recognize our faults, not the faults of our neighbors.

The Board of Trustees has worked intently over the last year to make Temple a "better" place, not merely from an individual standpoint, but for the betterment of the entire congregation. I am fortunate to have had many open discussions with the executive board, the general board, congregants, Temple clergy and staff. I have always expressed to you that it is my role to create a vision for the Temple, as well as being a "facilitator."

This reminds me of a story I heard for incoming Temple Presidents. There was an individual sitting on a plane waiting for it to depart. The plane sat on the runway not moving. Finally some 30 minutes after its scheduled departure, the stewardess announced that the plane was not taking off, because the pilot heard horrible noises coming from the engine, and it was going to be a while until they could locate another pilot! Having a successful Temple is a total effort fueled by all components. A "pilot" is just one ingredient. There are times when the quickest solution may not be the best solution. The communication between the Board, the congregants, and the staff are all needed in making Temple Israel soar.

ADULT EDUCATION SERIES MONDAYS FROM 7:00-9:00 P.M. OCTOBER 8, 15, 22 AND 29

There will be two fifty minute classes on the dates published. The first hour will be "Mishkan Tefillah" unveiled. It will be a tour through the Reform Movement's new Siddur, led by Rabbi Lipper.

The second hour will be entitled "The Origins of Human Violence and the Crisis of the Biblical First Family." This hopes to be a multi-faceted approach to the very first biblical story.

We have had many successes and accomplishments at Temple over the last year. Some are as follows:

- Enhanced Adult Education programs, in some instances attracting over I00 people.
- A Jewish Festival drawing over 70 vendors and approximately 3,000 people. This has the potential of becoming our major fundraiser. We need all of you to participate on October 14.
- The diversity of the 92nd Street Y programs.
- A Brotherhood and Sisterhood recognized and envied by synagogues around the nation for their unique programming.
- The interest in the Akron Interfaith Council programs.
- The Pennies for People program remembering the Holocaust, publicized in over 30 states, England, Jerusalem, and around the world. This monumental task has created a memorable experience for our children.
- The popularity of Mitzvah Day attracting 300 congregants and benefiting 30 agencies.
- Servicing the needs of over 150 MRDD individuals by providing exceptional programs that could not take place without our congregants volunteering.
- Improved Outreach programs, including a Tu B'Shevat Seder hosting over 100 people. We must not forget that there are one million interfaith families in the United States, and only one in five has affiliated with a synagogue. We must continue to reap the richness and vitality that Jews by choice can bring to our community and find innovative ways to engage these families. We will continue to be creative in this area.
- The popularity and camaraderie of our Shabbat Shelly service and dinner. Please continue your participation and financial support to guarantee these events for many years to come.

The list goes on. A sincere thanks to all of our committee chairs and committee members. All committee chairs are listed in our Yearbook. Please find a committee which interests you and call any one of our chairmen. It is your involvement that keeps Temple strong.

One area that we did not address to our fullest capacity is our Endowment Plan. This Plan will be specifically tied to our Long Range Plan. The Endowment Plan was not the priority over the last year. I had hoped it would be, as we needed to clarify how these funds would be designated. Again, we have addressed some of the key issues in our Long Range Plan and in the months ahead, will have a clearer vision as to our future and the restarting of the Endowment Fund.



Ms. Doades will speak at Shabbat services on November 9. On Sunday, November II she will meet with our 6th, 7th and 8th grade students and parents.



BOOK GROUP

The Temple Israel Book Group will meet on Tuesday, October 30 at I:00 p.m. in the Library to discuss *The Book Thief* by Markus Zusack. Copies of the book are on reserve at the Ayres Northwest Branch Library.

"The Book Thief was supposed to be a small book - only a hundred pages or so. When I was growing up, I heard stories at home about Munich and

Vienna in war-time, when my parents were children. Two stories my mother told me affected me a lot. The first was about Munich being bombed, and how the sky was on fire, how everything was red. The second was about something else she saw...

"One day, there was a terrible noise coming from the main street of town, and when she ran to see it, she saw that Jewish people were being marched to Dachau, the concentration camp. At the back of the line, there was an old man, totally emaciated, who couldn't keep up. When a teenage boy saw this, he ran inside and brought the man a piece of bread. The man fell to his knees and kissed the boy's ankles and thanked him. Soon, a soldier noticed and walked over. He tore the bread from the man's hands and whipped him for taking it. Then he chased the boy and whipped him for giving him the bread in the first place. In one moment, there was great kindness and great cruelty, and I saw it as the perfect story of how humans are.

"When I remembered those stories, I wanted to build them into a small book, like I said. The result was *The Book Thief*, and it came to mean much more to me than I could have imagined. No matter what anyone ever says about that book, whether good or bad, I know it was the best I could do, and I don't think a writer can ask for more of himself than that."

Spiritual, Music Shabbat: Rabbi Moshe Cotel

Rabbi Moshe Cotel will perform at a Musical Shabbat following services on Friday, October 19 at Temple Israel. Rabbi Cotel took early retirement from the Peabody Conservatory of Music in May 2000 in order to undertake full-time



rabbinical studies. He was ordained at the Academy for Jewish Religion in New York and now serves as the Rabbi of Temple Beth El, Manhattan Beach, Brooklyn. Rabbi Cotel is a proficient pianist who will perform works by Bach, Mendelssohn and Gershwin, among others.

Rabbi Moshe Cotel's unique one-man show is a fascinating mix of classical piano and rabbinics. In a series of highly personal

monologues interspersed with keyboard music spanning the classical period, Cotel recounts his private journey from one world to another—from the life of a virtuoso musician to that of spiritual leader.

Along the way, we encounter not only great music which has withstood the test of time, but also great wisdom from the Jewish tradition which is fully alive today. This program has much to teach us about a life well-lived, about music and spirituality, about joy and love, about art and Torah.



In spite of all of the successes at Temple, we continue to face challenges which seem to intensify, due mainly to shrinking demographics. It has been Temple Israel's history over 140 years to make sacrifices when needed and changes when required, to secure our long-term success. Here are the cold facts:

In the last fifteen years our Jewish population in the Akron area has declined almost in half. Our Temple membership has decreased during that same time from over 700 family units to fewer than 500.

In addition, 40% of our congregation is 66 years or older. Another 48% is between the ages of 45 and 65. This leaves only 12% of our congregation under 45 years old. We continue to fight this downward trend.

Please understand we are not alone. The Northeast and Midwest states with once-thriving Jewish communities have seen thousands of members head south and west. In 1960, 80% of American Jewry lived in the Northeast and Midwest; today barely half live here according to the latest National Jewish Publication. From 1980 until now, Toledo's Jewish community has gone from 7,500 to 3,900, Albany from 13,500 to 3,500, Providence from 22,000 to 7,500, and Syracuse from 11,000 to 5,000, to name just a few.

So what have we been doing to secure Reform Judaism in Akron, Ohio? I would like to repeat a quote I used last Yom Kippur. It was President John F. Kennedy who stated, "There are risks and costs to action. But they are far less than the long range risks and costs of comfortable inaction." Our Long Range Plan was the insight and vision of the late Ken Weinberger. This plan helped us recognize that our community will continue to change. Thus, we must take the initiative in order to provide for our future. We must evaluate our options while we are still strong enough to have choices to consider.

As most of you are aware, we have had meetings upon meetings with Beth El which is obviously sharing the same concerns that we are. The meetings involved Ritual and Educational chairs, clergy, Temple presidents, vice presidents, and individuals involved in the

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Long Range Plan. The major discussions have involved Art Krakauer and Larry Kaye representing Temple Israel, and myself; Alice Schneider, Steve Newman, and Rochelle Stone representing Beth El, as well as some meetings with the JCBA. The overall cohesiveness between the two synagogues was beyond all expectations. I am pleased to announce our first significant recommendation for consideration. At the October Board meeting at both Temple and Beth El, we will be reviewing and then voting on the approval of a blueprint for a joint congregational school to commence in September 2008. Again, demographics have played a major role in this decision. It seems like just yesterday that we had hundreds of children in our religious school. Today we have a grand total of 76 children in our school while Beth El has 57. We only have three children in second grade and four in the fifth grade. Beth El has two children in the first and third grades and only three in the fifth grade. We believe our children will benefit by being with other Jewish children in the community and building numbers in the classroom.

Another area of concentration as called for by our Long Range Plan was the evaluation of our building in light of our demographics. The love for this building and the history associated with it is incredibly strong. I, as well as many of our congregants, associate this glorious building as our sacred home. We, however, must recognize this facility is over 95 years old, and it has been 20 years since our last renovation. Roof repairs, some of them major in the years ahead, HVAC configurations, carpeting, sanctuary improvements and so on, plague us. Our building is also extremely energy inefficient and may not be able to be retrofitted to meet our long-term needs. With the points just mentioned of serious concern, we have engaged an architectural firm to produce multiple renovation drawings at a common site. We must review all of our options and be flexible and open whether we elect to stay or eventually move. What I can promise without any negotiation is that, at all costs, we will maintain a home for Reform Judaism in Akron, Ohio. We will never sacrifice anything that will ever lessen our identity, customs, or practices. I repeat: this cannot and will not be negotiable.

There is much work ahead of us, but again, we must make choices while we are strong enough to have choices to make. We will not make any decisions without the complete communication and understanding of our congregants. On the other hand, these decisions affect all of us, not just a few, and we need to work together and communicate together. We, as guardians of Temple Israel, must continue to recognize and react to our changing community. Our obligation is to provide for the future of Reform Judaism in Akron, Ohio. The initiative and action required would ensure Temple Israel's survival leading to a proud legacy that we all can carry forward.

I would like to thank our officers, Art Krakauer, Ron Winer, Joyce Butlien, Bob Godshall, and Elaine Jaffe, as well as the entire Board of Trustees for their support. I would also like to thank Rabbi David Lipper, Cantorial Soloist Rory Sanders and the entire Temple staff for their commitment.
