

A RABBINATE OF PRESENCE

RABBI ROBERT FEINBERG

In upcoming editions of the *Window*, I will share my vision of the future of our temple and my role in it. But for my first article, I want to tell you what has been for me one of the most essential aspects of being a rabbi. It is to be present. It is to serve as a pastor.



When people hear this word, they often associate it with Christian ministers, many of whom publicly use the professional title of pastor. However, the concept of the rabbi as a pastor has deep roots in our heritage. Visiting the sick and comforting the bereaved are responsibilities that rabbis have fulfilled for 2000 years, but the concept of the rabbi as a pastor, as one who is "present" for members of the congregation extends beyond supporting people in times of distress and sorrow.

Each of our lives tells a story. The need to tell our story may be especially compelling during pivotal moments of our journey--we become ill, a loved one dies, or a child makes plans to marry and move away--but sometimes the need to tell our story arises for no apparent reason. In all of these instances, there should be someone

we can turn to, in trust and confidence, someone who will hear us.

My experience has taught me to treat the story of a person's life as I would a Torah. It is a sacred testimony which must be treated with the utmost reverence and respect. While I look forward to the many times I will teach Torah and preach about Torah in our temple, an even more daunting responsibility is to be present for you, to listen to the unique, individual stories that make you who you are.

This is my commitment to you: I will make myself totally available to you in good times and bad. When the need arises, I will visit you and your family members on a regular basis in hospitals and other healthcare facilities. My cell phone number will be provided to temple members. Please do not hesitate to call, even if you simply need a listening ear.

I know that Temple Israel has been served by much-beloved rabbi-pastors in its distinguished history, and I intend to further that heritage. My most important goal is to provide you what you richly deserve: a rabbinate of presence.

From the president

ART KRAKAUER

Dear Friends,

A year ago I stood here and stated that I had no agenda other than to maintain a reform Jewish presence in Akron for as long as possible. The actions of our Board over the past year have supported that simple goal. I believe, we are in a stronger position now than we were a year ago.

Over the past year Cantor Rosenman has blended in to our Temple family. He arrived here at a complicated time. He was able to effectively work with our Temple staff, our members, and our board. That in itself is not an easy task. He has learned a lot about our congregation, and as time goes on, I know that he and we will continue to bond and build on our strengths.

We have found a new Rabbi. I would like to thank Elaine Jaffe, Michael Neumann, and the search committee for their efforts which ultimately resulted in the best possible outcome. Early in the search process, the committee stated that if we did not find a Rabbi that was outstanding, we would not hire anyone. We would just wait for a year and try again. At one point in time, it seemed that we would not hire a Rabbi this year. Then, the stars must have been aligned in the right order because we found him. Rabbi Feinberg will officially begin July 1st. He and Myra are here tonight. Please help me welcome them to our congregation.

During the past year we have restructured our board. We reduced the size of the board from 32 members to 23 members. Each elected board member will chair a committee. We have made changes to our by-laws to accommodate the change in the number of board members. We have also documented term limits for our officers and board members.

Just as we have restructured our board, so the Union for Reform Judaism is in the process of restructuring the Union. The regional offices are now gone. The budget and overhead for the Union is greatly reduced. The support that we receive from our national organization will be based more on technology and less on face to face visits. The one area that is not affected by the Union for Reform Judaism reorganization is our youth. The budget for the Union for Reform Judaism camps was not reduced. Our youth are our future leaders, and they deserve our full support.

We have survived a tough year from a financial perspective. During the past year, we spent more money than we took in. We are still here, and we still have most of our assets intact. Our endowment money and our tribute funds are invested conservatively. In the coming year, we plan to build our endowment significantly. We intend to focus on our finances and strengthen our financial resolve. Just last week a group of people met to discuss an acquisition which is in process. A building on Springside Drive is being purchased by a small group of private investors. It could be donated to the Akron Jewish community primarily for synagogue use. Discussions will begin soon within our board and with Beth El. Other Jewish organizations in town could also be involved. This is an exciting time for our community. We need to insure that this process is handled appropriately for all involved.

There have been many wonderful highlights over the past year. To single out a few is difficult, but please allow me. Our Social Action Committee has maintained and enhanced its activities. As you know, Mitzvah Day is planned for June 28th. Howard Friedman, chair of our Social Action Committee, is working with St Paul's, the Unitarian Universalist Church, and Bath Church to continue our

Carol Friedman, our Sisterhood President, has done a great job this year. Ladies night out, Chanukah Dinners, and Shiva assistance all benefit our congregation.

Our Sunday School is still the finest in the area. Recently, changes in fees have been implemented which should help to balance the budget.

The core of our congregation is our membership. Over the past year we lost a net of 15 units of membership. Frankly, that is not bad, considering what is happening all around us. Hopefully, in the coming year we will expand our Temple family. We will reach out to the unaffiliated. We will reach out to those who deliberately departed from our congregation. We will work to make inactive members active members. We will reach out to the old as well as the young. A recent demographic survey of our members shows that 85% of our members are 50 years old or older. 16% are 80 or older. Understanding that change has been stressful for many of our members, we will concentrate on healing our Temple Israel family. Numerous social gatherings are being planned for the summer. This is one way of introducing Rabbi Feinberg to our congregation and, at the same time, strengthening the bond among our members.

I would like to thank our Retiring board members for their efforts to make our congregation great. Marty Adams has done a terrific job creating our marketing committee. Cathy Baer helped us with outreach and fundraising. Paul Baker has been a stabilizing influence on our Board. Carol Friedman has done a great job with Sisterhood. Howard Friedman grabbed the reigns of the Social Action committee. His enthusiasm is contagious, and we probably have more members of the committee now than we ever had. Mark Gersman has worked on our Long Range plan. Larry Kaye created our Long Range Plan and worked on negotiations with Beth El. Thom Mandel emceed the farewell event for Rabbi Lipper. Leslie Ungar worked hard on our search committee. Milt Wiskind gave us the benefit of his wisdom and experience as a past President of our congregation, and Sarah Yuronka was active with our Sunday School.

I would like to thank our clergy, and our staff, for their contributions during the past year. The quality and dedication of our staff and clergy is the life of our congregation. Our exec board has functioned extremely well over the last year. The energy and spirit of our exec board enables us to thrive. I would like to thank my wife, Shelley, and my children, Margie, Lesley, and Daniel for allowing me the time to devote to Temple.

As a congregation we have come a long way in 145 years. May we in the year to come continue to work for the continuity of Reform Judaism in Akron. May we strive to fulfill the needs of our members, our movement, and our community.
