"Words from the Heart"

ou see and hear it everywhere. In television and radio talk shows, magazine pages, even in conversation among friends and neighbors - people are talking about spirituality. In a culture more secular than any prior century, people are seeking personal meaning through faith. It is an interesting and encouraging phenomenon. It seems that the more secular

our society becomes, the greater the need people have to feel rooted in faith, to search for meaning, and to find a perspective that grounds them in something more than the passing fancy of the day. This is an exciting challenge for contemporary life, but it is not without precedent. For you see, in the broad general terms of how we might define the concept of "spirituality," I would suggest that "spirituality is the act of drawing from the wellspring of faith


and religion to find living, nourishing springs of meaning for our daily lives." In my Kesher article this month, and next month as well, I want to focus on what that means for us as contemporary Reform Jews. I hope to share with you some of the sources from which I draw my own sense of spirituality.

As Jews, we have an immeasurable wellspring of tradition, learning, prayer, community and history. For us, spirituality is not simply the way that we pray or the way that we relate with God. For us, spirituality is the act of making religion live for us in our daily lives and, therefore, bring meaning to the mundane. There are many things

that enable us to make our faith more than a rote recitation of blessings or a celebration of holidays. In Judaism, spirituality can be discovered in a variety of ways: through worship (Avodah), through study (Torah) and through deeds (G'milut Chasadim).

Some of us find spirituality in our deeds. Judaism teaches that religion is not found in a clois-

tered setting where we separate from the world and remove ourselves from its demands. Rather, as Jews are commanded to live our faith, and this means taking its teachings into the world. It means doing tikkun olam, repairing the world with our ideals and our aspirations, so that we can do our part to uplift the world, or our little corner of it, from the place that it is, to a place a little closer to where we think it ought to be. When we volunteer,

fulfillment in history. How rooted in time we feel when we realize that the challenges of our lives are not unique to us, that generations of people have struggled with certain fundamental issues and questions. Just as the Talmud is written as a document where scholars who lived in different times and eras debate one another, drawing on the wisdom of early layers of teachers, so too, all that we draw from our faith is because we stand on the shoulders of those who came before us. When we seek to understand how the ancients, or those who lived in other lands or other times, responded to similar issues of human life, we come to discern a deeper sense of meaning. When we look at one idea or one principle and trace it through the many layers of Jewish history to see how our ancestors wrestled with it and found meaning, we draw upon a limitless resource of wisdom for our own day. How liberating it is to know that we are not the first to ever face a problem and that we are not alone. How inspiring it is to know that wise teachers from early ages can provide

But we can only glean this wisdom of the past when we study. So, therefore, our spirituality is found in the act of learning. For unlike many other faiths, in Judaism the act of learning also is a sacred act. That is why we are the "people of the book." We study not merely for knowledge but for discernment. We study to understand and to live our values. We study not merely to know more, but to understand more about how our faith informs our deeds. We study not because we value intelligence or knowledge, but because we believe that our knowledge leads to discernment, and that discernment leads to wisdom. We study because we believe that such wisdom balances us against the storms of contemporary life.

to us the gleanings of their own experiences

and wisdom.

I have shared three sources of my own spirituality which I believe our faith offers to each of us as an abiding gift: deeds of kindness, rootedness in history, and study – each serving as parallel spiritual paths on which our souls should travel. Next month, I hope to share with you the path of prayer as another necessary ingredient of our spiritual journey....



Now In Our Temple Library... A Revolution In Educational Technology

hat's right. The Ralph and Julia Cohen Library has the latest breakthrough in library technology: it has no wires, no batteries, no circuits, nothing to switch on. The youngest of children can operate it. It is compact and portable, yet powerful enough to hold as much information as a CD-ROM.

The Bio-Optic Organized Knowledge device (trade name: Book) is constructed of sequentially numbered sheets of paper, each capable of holding thousands of bits of information.



How does it work? Each sheet is scanned optically, registering information directly into your brain. A flick of the finger takes you to the next sheet. Its "browse" feature allows you to move instantly to any sheet, and move forward or backward as you wish. Many come with an index feature which pinpoints the exact location of any selected information for instant retrieval. An optional "bookmark" even allows the user to open Book to the exact place s/he left it in a previous session, and these bookmarks meet universal design standards. They will work with any Book, regardless of manufacturer, and can be had for only pennies.

Book never crashes or needs rebooting, (although, like other devices, it can become damaged if coffee is spilled on it.) It is safe to use anywhere – on an airplane, sitting in your easy chair, even in the hot tub! Untold numbers of content creators are committed to this platform and your Wise Temple Library already has thousands of them in stock. Stop by the Temple Library and check some out!
