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## **FROM THE RABBI'S DESK** ~Hava Nagila, Harry Belafonte and Passover~

The Cincinnati Jewish and Israeli Film Festival opened this year with a showing of "Hava Nagila" at the Cincinnati Museum Center. Roberta Grossman's film traces the development and influence of the music to which we usually dance the hora at weddings and b'nei mitzvahs. A highlight of the movie for me was a clip of Harry Belafonte singing this Jewish folk song with Danny Kaye. But more importantly was what Belafonte said about the song. Belafonte said that this music (along with the "Banana Boat Song") was what made each of his shows light up around the world. In particular, he remembered the emotion he felt while singing it in Germany not long after World War II. Belafonte speaks in the film of the pure joy that Hava Nagila transmits.

Hava Nagila-which means, "come, let us rejoice" has become ubiquitous. We find it schmaltzy and perhaps trite. It has sometimes been stripped of its meaning and been appropriated. It has sometimes become a stand-in for Jewish literacy. Some hate Hava Nagila, some resent it. But Belafonte really rescued this music for me in the documentary. Because sometimes it takes someone from outside, but someone who understands your story to repeat it back to you. Sometimes we need to look at ourselves from beyond ourselves in order to understand our story's meaning. With Hava Nagila, we have taught the world some true joy.

What else does our story teach? As we move forward to Passover, our congregation, along with Valley Temple will be able to understand our story of freedom in a new way. We will be looking inside and outside at Exodus together at the Freedom Center. I invite you to join with our community as we explore the Passover story and the story



of African slavery together. We will understand our wanderings from slavery to freedom and how they are intertwined with the Civil Rights narrative. We will grapple with our histories along with the present as we consider how to meet the future. The dialogue we will have with each other and with the Museum exhibits will serve to help us see something new and challenging.

Please join with us on March 17th for Let My People Go: A Passover Experience at the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center from 9:30-12:00. We will begin with breakfast, continue with a communal experience and move on to learn in smaller groups. The program is for children, families and adults. While there are educational opportunities for our Religious School students, there are also learning sessions for adults who come without children. This collaborative program is free to you. It is funded by a grant from the Bureau of Jewish Education Endowment Fund, administered by the Jewish Community Education Council (JCEC) and the Mayerson JCC. Please see the ad in this bulletin for more information. I look forward to learning with you, in dialogue from within and without. And may this Passover be a season of meaning for all.

## **FROM OUR RABBINIC INTERN** ~Our Story Begins with Freedom~

uring the months of November and December, I had the privilege of teaching a short T'filah (prayer) **Enrichment** course to our 4th, 5th, and 6th grade Hebrew classes. For six weeks, I spent fifteen minutes in each of these classrooms, talking about prayer, tradition, and music with our grade school students. The 4<sup>th</sup> grade class, with one year of Hebrew instruction under its belt, focused its T'filah Enrichment time on the prayer "Mi Chamocha." Together, we learned that the words of Mi Chamocha come straight from our Torah, from the Book of Exodus, and are part of a section of text we call "Shirat HaYam," the Song of the Sea. We explored the meaning of the phrase "Who is like You, God?" and decided that this must be a rhetorical question, used to explain God's awesomeness. And with the energy that comes with being a group of 4<sup>th</sup> graders, we danced and sang these words for weeks on end, learning a multitude of musical settings for the words, proclaiming together as a small "community" of learners and pray-ers, that God is indeed awesome, because God granted us freedom.

As part of my rabbinical thesis, I created and piloted this T'filah Enrichment course in our Hebrew School. Thesis requirements aside, this was an extremely rewarding experience for me, just as I hope it was for our students. As a lover of all things prayer and music, I was particularly excited to teach our young learners all about the relationship between liturgy and sacred music, just what we do to pray as Jews, and the connections between our prayers and our experience as the Jewish people. And though I didn't teach this particular idea to our T'filah Enrichment participants, I thought I would expand my project to include the rest of the congregation, as well! Here is a bit of T'filah Enrichment for all of us to share in light of the upcoming observance of Passover:

☆Shema/V'ahavta ~ Revelation☆Mi Chamocha ~ Redemption

I always find it interesting that the prayers occur in our service in the above order. Wouldn't it make more sense to place Shema/V'ahavta after Mi Chamocha, since we were redeemed from Egypt before we received the Torah? This gets even more confusing when we consult our medieval commentator Rashi.

Rashi, at the very beginning of the Book of Genesis, writes that God should not have begun the Torah with the story of Creation, but rather with the first commandment given to the Israelites – that of the pascal lamb, found in the story of the Exodus from Egypt! When we consider that many of our commandments are often supported by the idea that "I led you out of Egypt to be your God" (or something like it), we begin to understand that our identity as the Jewish people began with our redemption from Egypt.

Rabbi Elliot Dorff writes that the Redemption story is, in fact, the "birth story" of the Jewish people. He explains that, "God redeemed us from Egypt not because of our size, power, or worth, but because God chose to love us and to do special things for us, so that indeed, on condition that we carry out the Godgiven mission articulated at Sinai. More than freedom from slavery, the Jewish birth-story of redemption is freedom to become responsible partners with God in the ongoing divine acts of creation, revelation, and redemption."

In this season of redemption, as we sit down to our seder tables, may we all experience the relationship between our liturgy and sacred music, understand what it means to learn and pray as Jews, and find the connections between our prayers and our experience as the Jewish people.

Chag Pesach Sameach!

tories. Who doesn't love to hear a great story? Children are often heard chanting, "Again, again!" at the end of a story, especially one that truly engages them with all of their senses. Last month, several of us teachers had a wonderful opportunity to learn about the art of storytelling from world-renowned storyteller and author, Peninnah Schram. Ms. Schram talked about three tools of storytelling: voice, Bbdy and imagination. For the voice, she stressed the importance of varying one's volume, pitch, pace and quality, making sure to also utilize silence and pauses. Body language is very important when telling a story, and for this tool, she demonstrated various ways of carrying one's body in order to convey different aspects of the story. Finally, for imagination, she summed it up by saying, "I don't tell stories with words. I tell stories with images."

In Judaism, one of our greatest stories is that of the Exodus from Egypt. It is not difficult to utilize the tools mentioned above when retelling the events that unfolded several thousands of years ago. In fact, when we gather around our Seder tables on Passover, we do just that; we engage everyone in



remembering the story, from the horrible years of enslavement all the way through the miraculous departure from Egypt. If you're looking for some different ideas on how to share the story of Passover, we have many resources available upstairs in our library. Come check them out!

Along the lines of Passover and storytelling, I would like to share with you a very exciting congregational event that will take place in March. Along with Valley Temple, on March 17 we will explore the meaning of Passover at the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center (NURFC). As part of our exploration we will examine our Jewish connections to freedom, both in the Exodus from Egypt through our ancestors and in our own migrations from various parts of the world to Cincinnati. In partnership with NURFC, we will also explore the parallels between our freedom stories: the Exodus from Egypt and that of African slavery and the Civil Rights movement, focusing on how our stories are intertwined and how freedom, or the lack thereof, affects all of us.

On March 17, we welcome our Religious School families, as well as our entire congregation to take this adventure together. More details to come!

## **ENVIRONMENTAL COMMITTEE** ~Become a CSA Member~

▼ pring is the season of beginnings. This year we hope to begin offering Rockdale Temple members share in a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA), in which fresh farm produce is delivered to the Temple for pickup on Tuesday evenings. Enrollment consists of paying at the start of the growing season for a share of the farm's seasonal produce. A share consists of a box of vegetables every week or two from the farm. Our Harvest CSA has agreed to deliver shares of their farm's 2013 produce to Rockdale Temple if a minimum of 15 people commit to purchasing farm shares. Joining a CSA for a season is a wonderful opportunity to connect with the food you eat, the environment where it's grown, and the farmers that feed us.

A growing season starts slowly after the winter. Only the leafy part of vegetables has had time to grow by May, other than root vegetables planted the previous fall. Nonetheless, spring shares of seasonal produce may include broccoli, carrots, kale, lettuce, onions, radish, spinach, sugar snap peas, and swiss chard. By the end of summer, your share of produce will be an embarrassing bounty with such items as basil, beans, corn, cucumbers, eggplant, fingerling potatoes, garlic, melons, okra, peppers, tomatoes, and zucchini. Until harvest ends in November, autumn shares include beans, beets, bok choy, lettuce, pumpkin, sweet potatoes, turnips, winter squash, and more.

By purchasing seasonal food directly from a local farm, consumers and farmers both benefit. Your fruits and vegetables are grown organically and arrive within days of harvest. In contrast, produce in supermarkets may be harvested before ripe and bred not for taste but hardiness to endure a journey of hundreds or thousands of miles from farm to market. Farmers benefit from CSAs because customers who pay upfront make it easier to plan the farming season. By joining a CSA, you'll have a meaningful experience learning about food, cooking, and our environment by enjoying your farm share, invited farm visits, and weekly newsletters with pictures, recipes, and updates from the farm.

To join, send a \$50 check without delay payable to "Our Harvest CSA" and add the note, "Pickup at Rockdale Temple." Final payment is due May 1<sup>st</sup>. Choose between a pickup of:

> ♥Whole share = \$550 (6-10 items, feeds 4-6 people each week)
> ♥Half share = \$300 (4-6 items,

feeds 2-3 people each week).

## LIBRARY UPDATE ~New Library Catalog System~

his winter, the library was lucky to receive from elsewhere at Rockdale a newer. faster computer with a newer operating system. Ironically, it was a mixed blessing in that all the data that resided in the old computer, namely the library's digital catalog of holdings files, then needed to move to the new computer. And further, to continue to the catalog on the new computer, we needed to upgrade to new library software! So down the rabbit hole we went into that dizzying world ...

Most programs were too expensive and far more complex than we needed, capable of fully automating circulation and networking with search computers, other libraries, etc. All for only thousands of dollars!

Thankfully, I believe I found a perfectly adequate upgrade of a system that will be well within the Library's and the Temple's budget. It will do all we need it to, and more---once we negotiate the full install and then the learning curve! Best of all, it will allow us to place on Temple's website (on the Sidney Rose Library page, that pops up under the Education tab) a link allowing you to search the Temple's library holdings for books of interest to you. It is my understanding that congregants will also be able to place a "hold" on library materials, essentially asking me to set aside for you the books you request, so that you can find them easily to check out when you come to the library.

Not all of our Library's collection is digitally cataloged---only the materials that have been added since 1996. But they number about two thirds of our total collection, and the newer ones at that. All these will be searchable from the Temple website's link.

I hope to have the new system up and running as soon as I possibly can! When the Library link is up on the website, I will let you know. Meanwhile, if you need to communicate with the library for whatever reason, write to: <u>library@rockdaletemple.org</u>
