All young people, married and single, are cordially invited to attend the decorous and inspiring services. Young people who are strangers in the city will also be made welcome.

Children's Services

In accordance with our annual custom, the beautiful and inspiring Children's Services for the High Holy Days, will this year be held for Rosh Hashonah on Thursday, September 9 at 2:30 P. M., and for Yom Kippur on Saturday, September 18 at 1 P. M. in the Temple proper.

The services will be read, and the sermons preached by members of the 1925 and 1926 confirmation class. The children will also be addressed by Mr. David W. Pearlman, our new Director, and by Rabbi Brickner.

Parents are urged to arrange that their children attend these services. The children will occupy the center of the Temple. Parents present at these services kindly take seats at the rear or side sections of the Temple.

In Memoriam

The names of dear ones who have passed away since last Yom Kippur, which are to be read at the Memorial Service, must be sent to the office of the Rabbi, no later than Thursday, September 16.

Members will be expected to present their cards of admission at each service, and also requested to bring the Union Prayer Book, Vol. II revised edition. No Prayer Books will be distributed nor sold on the High Holy Days.

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Associate Rabbi

The Rev. Dr. Abraham Cronbach, Professor of Social Studies at the Hebrew Union College, who is so well and favorably known to the Congregation, will again be associated with Rabbi Brickner during the coming High Holy Days.

For Rosh Hashonah, Dr. Cronbach will alternate with Rabbi Brickner, officiating in the Auditorium at the evening service, and in the Temple at the morning service. Rabbi Brickner will conduct the evening service in the Temple, and in the morning will occupy the pulpit at the Auditorium service. A similar arrangement will be followed for Yom Kippur.

Religious Schools

Sunday, September 19, at 9:15 A. M., will mark the opening session of the Religious School. All pupils are requested to return to their former classrooms, where they will be assigned to their new grades. An Assembly of all the children in the religious school will conclude the opening session.

Pupils entering the religious school this year for the first time, are requested to register on Sunday, September 12, from 9:30 to 12, and must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

Children who, at the close of Sunday School last June, were not promoted to the next grade, will be privileged to take a re-examination on Wednesday, September 14, at 4:15 P. M., which will allow them to rejoin their class, provided they pass.
