### *Opening Meeting Monday, Oct. 18*

Prof. Moritz Bonn, Professor of Political Economy of the College of Commerce at the University of Berlin, will be the speaker at the Men's Club dinner meeting, which will open the season on Monday evening, October 18. Prof. Bonn will speak on "The Financial Reconstruction of Europe, and Reparations."

Prof. Bonn is one of the greatest European economic experts, and an author and lecturer of international reputation. He came to America last July at the special invitation of the International Institute of Politics at Williamstown, to give a series of lectures on the economic conditions of Europe. He is about to return to Europe, and we are fortunate to secure his consent to address us just before he leaves our shores.

Mr. David Dietz, Science Editor of the Cleveland Press, commences his lectures on Sunday morning, October 10. ## RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

### *Well-attended Harvest Festival*

A throng of children and adults filled the Temple last Thursday morning, in spite of the inclement weather, for the beautiful Children's Harvest Festival, which was part of the Succoth Services. Rabbi Brickner discussed the Succoth Festival, in its relation to the American Thanksgiving Day, and spoke of the Jewish influence on the Pilgrim and Founding Fathers. The children rendered a beautiful program, under the direction of Miss Alice Neuman.

The lovely Sukkah, erected by the Sisterhood Altar Committee, was greatly admired by the Congregation, and last Sunday morning, streams of our Religious School children viewed the Sukkah, and had it explained by their teachers.

### *Temple Attendance Required*

All pupils of the ninth grade, irrespective of their confirmation in 1927, are required to attend Temple services Saturday morning at 10:30, commencing this Saturday, and to take seats in the front of the Temple. This attendance will be recorded by the teachers, on Sunday, and will be counted toward the pupil's general standing, especially for distribution of honor parts at confirmation and other occasions.

### *Attendance*

Sixteen out of the thirty-seven classes of the school had red and gold star attendance records for last Sunday. This means that their attendance was between 95% and 100%. We trust that these classes, which have set the pace, will keep it up, and that others will follow in their lead.

The enrollment this year is one of the largest in the history of the school. It taxes to capacity every available schoolroom on Sunday morning. If the school grows any larger—well, we hate to say . .

### *High School Department*

Two hundred students are registered in the High School Department, composed of three grades and five classes. We are happy to state that over 90% of the 1926 confirmation class has returned, and are registered in the tenth grade. At the High School Assembly last Sunday morning, Irving Whitman and Chas. Rosen gave the President's and Treasurer's reports of last

year's activities. Election of officers will be held next week. Be there! The future assemblies on Sunday mornings will be addressed by leaders in the Jewish community life of our city.

The High School Department plans to continue to hold its monthly Collegiate Sunday Forum Suppers, which were so successful last year, and in conjunction with the Alumni Association, will also conduct Sunday afternoon dansantes.

If you are a confirmant of our Temple, and have not yet registered in the High School Department, do so next Sunday. You will find the companionship congenial, and the work interesting.

### *Hebrew Instruction*

Next Sunday morning, Hebrew instruction will be started in all the grades from the first through the ninth. We hope you will like it. You ought to, for it is the language of our Prayer Book and service—of the Bible and the wonderful literature of our people.

### *Nursery Kindergarten Starts*

Mothers who have already signified their intention of registering their children will meet on Tuesday morning, October 5, at 10:30, in the Kindergarten Room of the Temple House, to discuss the final plans for starting the class. Rabbi Brickner, Mr. Pearlman and Miss Sylvia Friedman, will address the gathering.
