Who Is Professor Bonn?

The Men's Club feels that a real treat is in store for those who will attend its Opening dinner Meeting on Monday, October 18, because Prof. Moritz Bonn is to

be the speaker.

Dr. Bonn is Professor of Political Economy of the College of Commerce at the University of Berlin, Germany, and came to this country this Summer, to lecture, for the second time, at the Institute of Politics at Williamstown. Dr. Bonn, who speaks English fluently, was visiting Pro-fessor at the Universities of California, Cornell and Wisconsin, and is an outstanding authority on European Politics of today. He is an author and lecturer of international reputation.

David Dietz Talks

"Secrets of Science" will be the general title of the series of lectures which Mr. David Dietz, Science Editor of the Cleveland Press and the Scripps Howard Publications, will give this year for our Men's Club. The first lecture will be given at 9:30 A. M., next Sunday morning, October 10, in the Sisterhood Room of the Temple House.

Mr. Dietz will give seven lectures, one each Sunday morning from October 10 through November 21. On November 25 he will leave on a lecture tour, under the auspices of the Coit-Alber Lyceum Bureau, which will take him all the way from Boston to California.

Mr. Dietz, who is a confirmant and a member of our Temple, is well known for his work upon the popularization of science. He is a Fellow of the Royal Astronomical Society, and a member of the Societe Astronomique Du France.

Parents who bring their children to school, as well as others, should take advantage of these lectures which are open to the public.

Amy Rice Memorial

The Amy Rice Memorial Scholarship Fund was created by our Sisterhood, at its last Board meeting, in memory of the late Amy Rice, whose activities in connection with our Temple, and especially with our religious school, are remembered with a sense of deep loss.

The fund, totaling close to \$800, was raised by volunteer subscriptions sent in by 230 people, in memory of Mrs. Rice. The interest on this money will be used to give prizes annually to the student in the confirmation class, and in the graduating class of our High School Department, whose scholarship records throughout the years of their schooling in our Religious School, have made the highest grades. A committee of the Sisterhood, with Rabbi Brickner and Mr. Pearlman, will administer this fund.

It is hoped that this fund will increase from year to year, as friends of Amy Rice remember her on anniversaries of her death, or on other occasions, so that additional prizes may be given in other grades of the school. In this manner it is planned to perpetuate the memory of Amy Rice, in a way that embodies the chief interest of her life—religious education.

Community Sewing
