"What Is Light?"

"What Is Light?" will be the subject of the lecture by David Dietz on Sunday, October 17, at 9:30 A. M., in the Sisterhood Room. The lecture is over in time for Temple services at 10:30.

This will be the second lecture in the series by Mr. Dietz on "Secrets of Science." He will illustrate his lecture with both stereopticon slides and actual experiments, and will show how a locomotive can be stopped by a beam of light. For this purpose he will use photo-electric apparatus specially constructed for him by the General Electric Company. He will use a miniature electric locomotive in connection with the apparatus.

Rabbi Brickner was in the audience last Sunday, and said at the conclusion of Mr. Dietz's lecture: "If more people knew what they were missing, by not attending, this room would be too small to accommodate everyone who would want to come."

The lectures are open to the public.

A Zangwill Symposium
