### Sunday's Lectures

An unusually large congregation filled the Temple last Sunday, to listen to the Rabbi's discourse on "Mixed Marriage and its Consequences," which was broadcast over Station WTAM.

Next Sunday the rabbi will discuss the modern novel, with special reference to Prof. Erskine's two recent novels which have drawn the fire of criticism, especially from one of the leading New York divines, who spoke of them as "the most vicious that I have read in a generation," and who regards these two books and others like them among modern novels, as "moral poison." The rabbi will treat of the ethical elements that constitute a good and bad book.

Another large congregation will undoubtedly attend next Sunday. The congregation is requested to come on time. Services start promptly at 10:30.

We will continue to broadcast over Station WTAM for two additional Sunday mornings and evenings. The subject of the discourse next Sunday evening will be "The Quest for Happiness."

### Radio Comment

Many appreciative letters from many Gentiles as well as Jews have been received from all parts of the country, and from many points in Canada, commending the rabbi on his fearless and thought-provoking messages, also numerous requests for copies of the sermons. Following are a few extracts:

"I have always been a little prejudiced against the Jews, listening to everybody always harping on that the Jews' only God was their dollars, but I assure you

from now on, my attitude towards the Jewish people is changed forever."

"This is merely a word of appreciation for your masterful address Sunday on "Should the Flag Follow the Dollar?" It came in very nicely by radio, and was an inspiration not only to myself, but to my family as well. I am thankful indeed that in God's house we have men of your courage and fearlessness."

"I am a Gentile, but Jew or Gentile, we are all brothers in peace and war. So let us have peace."

"As we do not often have the opportunity of attending services, it surely is wonderful to hear sermons like yours." (This from someone in a small community.)

"You certainly gave me much to think about—and am sure others feel the same."

"As my young brother remarked out of the wisdom of his eighteen years 'If we could hear sermons like that, everyone would go to the Temple.' Thank you rabbi, I'll be one of your unseen audience tonight and a good many more Sundays, I hope."

"Is it possible to have a copy of your lecture, as I would like to pass it on to my co-workers who did not have the same good fortune as I did, to hear you."
