It is anticipated that an equally large congregation will attend next Sunday to hear the Rabbi discuss The Open Letter to Gov. Smith, in the Atlantic Monthly.

This letter challenges Gov. Smith to state how, as a loyal Roman Catholic, who must put the Church and the Pope before all temporal power, he can uphold the constitution of the United States which separate church from state, and the secular law which in this country takes precedence over church law.

Mr. Marshall is an authority on the canon law. He raises a great many questions concerning the possibility of a Catholic as well as a Jew to be president of these United States. It involves one of the most important religious issues before this country.

The Rabbi "On The Air" Again

Commencing at 7:15 next Saturday evening, April 9, and every Saturday thereafter, Rabbi Brickner will again be "on the air" over Station WTAM. He has accepted the invitation of this broadcasting station to introduce a new educational and cultural feature over the radio, which has never been tried in this country.

He will answer questions submitted by radio listeners care of Station WTAM, Cleveland, on subjects of an educational, religious, ethical, social and cultural character.

The Rabbi's answers to questions every Sunday morning after the lecture, which was broadcast, proved so popular that Station WTAM has received numerous requests that this feature be made a regular feature of the WTAM service.
