Our Library

During the past month, the Library has added many books. Miss Wolpaw recommends:

"History of Hebrew Civilization—Bertholet.

Luminous background of the literature of the Old Testament, and descriptions of ancient life of the desert and of the successive civilizations that flourished in Palestine.

"Palmerston"—Guedalla

The biography of the great statesman whose life was the life of England, and to a large extent of Europe in the last 16 years of the 18th, and first 65 of the 19th century.

"East Side, West Side"—Riesenberg.

An Epic of New York City.

"Rhapsody"—Schnitzler

A dream novel.

"Wedlock"—Wasserman

An impressive tremendous, dramatic account of the undermining and collapse of a man of particularly noble character. A masterpiece of fiction.

"Through Many Windows"—Woodward.

An epic of a woman's battles in New York, for her place, and a study in business psychology. Full of shrewd observations and rich nuggets of common sense.

The Rabbi Sails June 8th

The Rabbi begs to announce that he is scheduled to sail for Palestine on June 8th. He will visit Palestine and Eastern Europe this Summer, returning the middle of September.

Mr. Eugene Hibshman, senior student at the Hebrew Union College, who was with us last Summer, will officiate during his absence.

Jewish Education Campaign

Members of our Temple are urged to give generously to the campaign of the Bureau of Jewish Education which commences April 25.

The Bureau is the community's guarantee that the birthright of every Jewish child is a Jewish education.

The Bureau maintains the Talmud Torahs in which over 2000 children receive a thoroughgoing Hebrew training; seven Sabbath Schools conducted under the auspices of the Council of Jewish Women; The Jewish Teachers Institute for the training of teachers for the religious schools and the Hebrew schools; Summer Schools for religious training; and conducts numerous holiday celebrations in all Jewish neighborhoods, where thousands of Jewish children are gathered and told the significance of Jewish festivals. In a word—the Bureau is doing a great and constructive piece of Jewish work.

It is entitled to the support of every Jew—Reform, Conservative and Orthodox.

Its budget for the next year is \$100,320. It now has annual subscriptions totaling \$62,000. This campaign seeks to secure an additional \$38,320 in new annual subscriptions, and in increases over last year's.

This campaign has the endorsement of the Jewish Welfare Federation, all the Temples and Rabbis in Cleveland.
