The Sabbath morning sermons will, in reality, be Bible lessons whose religious and ethical teaching will bear a direct relation to the vital problems of our own life today.

The congregation is requested to read each week, the Biblical portion tradition-

ally assigned for the week.

For next Saturday's sermon, the Biblical reading is Genesis, Chapter VI-9 through XI-32. Thus in the course of the year, the congregation will acquire not only a knowledge, but, it is hoped, an appreciation of the Bible—the Book that nobody knows.
