Sunday Lecture

Next Sunday the Rabbi commences a series of addresses touching major problems before the American public, the first of which will be "If I Were City Manager —Can Government be Made Democratic and Efficient at the Same Time?"

The answer to this question is really at the heart of most of the political conflict in America.

Why is it that the best men refuse to enter politics?

Why does the trend in government, fluctuate between attempts at the introduction of efficiency through commission form of government, city manager form of government, and the old line corrupt political patronage system?

Why don't morals and politics mix?

Must Democracy be the rule of the mob?

The Rabbi will not only answer these questions, but will continue his practice of answering questions from the pulpit, following each lecture.
