### Sunday Services

"That Man Heine," a biography by Lewis Browne, with the research collaboration of Elsa Weihl, is the life story of one of the most fascinating and perplexing personalities of modern times. Heinrich Heine's whole life was one continuous storm of love, lust, wretchedness, strife, idealism, mendacity and a sublime literary achievement. Though born the son of a poor Jewish shopkeeper, in a little Rhineland town, he yet managed to make his career, as Nietzsche put it, veritably "a European event." He became the most brilliant satirist of his age, and the most popular lyric poet of all time. He giped a generation into rebellion, and made a whole world sing and weep.

The lecture on Sunday will deal with this most fascinating Jewish genius.

It is anticipated that the temple will again be filled as it was last Sunday, when an eager congregation listened with rapt attention to Rabbi Brickner's refutation of Clarence Darrow's theory that man is a machine, and that we are the puppets of fate.

The numerous written questions which came to the pulpit after the lecture, were an indication of the keen interest with which the congregation followed the Rabbi's lecture.

## Sabbath Services

The Biblical reading for next Sabbath is known as Va-Yishlah, and is to be found in Genesis XXXII-4 through XXXVI-43.

The congregation is requested to read these Biblical portions in preparation for the Sabbath sermon, in which the Rabbi expounds various passages giving the historical, ethical and religious significance that they still contain for modern Jews.
