Shabbath Shubah

The Sabbath preceding Yom Kippur, is known as the Sabbath of Repentance. Services will be held Friday at 5:30 P. M., and Saturday at 10:30 A. M., when Rabbi Brickner will also preach the sermon.

Yom Kippur

The melody of the old hymn Kol Nidre, has ever claimed the heart of the Jew. Services on the eve of Yom Kippur this year will begin with the rendition of Kol Nidre. It is hoped that everyone will be seated when the services begin Sunday, September 23rd at 7:45 P. M.

The names of dear ones who have passed away since last Yom Kippur, which are to be read at the Memorial Service on Yom Kippur afternoon, must be sent to the temple office no later than Friday, September 21st.

Members who do not have the holiday Prayer Book, may secure it at the temple office. No Prayer Books will be distributed or sold on the High Holy Days.

Services for the Succoth Festival will be held on Saturday, September 29th at 10:30 A. M. The concluding Succoth Service will be held on Saturday, October 6th at 10:30 A. M.

Isa Kremer At Succoth Meeting

Isa Kremer, the world's greatest singer of ballads and folk-songs, will be the guest-artist at the Succoth meeting—Tuesday, October 2nd—which will be the opening meeting of the year.

A luncheon at 12:30, in the Recreation Hall, will precede the program which will be given in the Auditorium at 2:30. Invitations have already been mailed to Sisterhood members, each of whom is entitled to bring one guest. Guest tickets may be

secured through the temple office. Members of the Sisterhood are urged to secure their guest tickets early, since admission will be by card only, and limited to the seating capacity of the Auditorium, for it is certain that the demand for tickets will be unusually large. Luncheon tickets at \$1.25 per plate, may also be secured at the temple office. The luncheon is limited to 600.

Isa Kremer has presented her programs in the principal cities of Europe, the United States and Canada. In New York City, upon several occasions, she has filled to overflowing, Carnegie Hall, where she is a favorite artist. She is an outstanding figure as an interpreter of folk songs and ballads of many peoples. The artistry of her interpretation has received the most superlative comments from critics.

She will render several Jewish numbers, in addition to her usual artistic program.

The New York Times says: "Her ballads were not merely interesting, they were vivid. She made the characters and the situations stand out, brought them within the range of everyone's imagination, magnetized her listeners."

Program cards, containing the courses elected by the students under the new plan of elective studies, will be distributed.

Registration

Registration of the Religious School was held on Sundays, September 2nd and 9th. Parents who have as yet not taken the opportunity to register their children, may do so by bringing them to the office on Sunday, September 23rd from 9 to 12.

Assembly

The opening session of the Religious School will conclude with an assembly of all the pupils. Rabbi Brickner and Mr. Brilliant will welcome the children back from their vacation, to a year of renewed activity.

Harvest Festival

The children of the Religious School will celebrate the **Feast of Tabernacles** on **Sunday, September 30th** at 9:30 A. M., with a Harvest Service in the Temple. The program is being prepared by Mrs. Braverman.

Children are requested to bring their Succoth offerings of corn, wheat, fruits, vegetables, autumn leaves, etc., on either Wednesday, September 26th, or Thursday, September 27th. Non-perishable fruits may be brought on the opening day of Sunday School, but fruits and vegetables should not be brought until Wednesday, since the Sukkah will be decorated on Friday.
