As usual, the temple pulpit will be transformed by the Sisterhood, into a Succah decorated with everbeautiful green, flowers and fruits of the Harvest season.

The concluding day of Succoth falls on Saturday, October 6.

#### MEN'S CLUB

### Political Symposium - Thurs., Oct. 11th

The Hon. Henry Morgenthau of New York, former Ambassador to Turkey, will speak for Alfred E. Smith, and Mr. Gilbert Bettman of Cincinnati will uphold the side of Herbert Hoover, at the Political Symposium which will open the Men's Club program in the Auditorium on Thursday evening, October 11th.

Mr. Henry Morgenthau, diplomat, lawyer and financier, was Chairman of the Finance Committee of the National Democratic Party in the Wilson Campaign, and a member of Woodrow Wilson's "unoffi-cial cabinet"; Ambassador to Turkey 1913-1916; nominated as Ambassador to Mexico, 1920; Chairman of Greek Refugee Settlement Commission created by the Lea-gue of Nations, 1923; Vice Chairman of the Near East Relief. He has been honored by many countries and is a per-sonal friend of the Democratic candidate for the presidency. He comes to us from New York especially for this occasion.

Mr. Gilbert Bettman, who comes spe-cially to us from Cincinnati, is the Republican nominee for Attorney-General of this state, and for a long time was State Commander of the American Legion. Mr. Bettman, one of the ablest lawyers in the state, is an unusually good speaker-eloquent and convincing.

The meeting will be open not only to the men of the temple, but to the women as well, and to the general public.

#### "Books and Authors"

Mr. Joseph Remenyi, instructor of Literature at the Cleveland College, prominent author and lecturer, Editor of the Szabadsag—the Cleveland Hungarian newspaper, whose course attracted so much attention last year, will again deliver a series of fourteen lectures on "Modern Books and their Authors," on alternate Friday mornings from 11 to 12 o'clock, under the auspices of the Sisterhood.

The first of these lectures will be held on Friday, October 12th at 11 A. M.

Mr. Remenyi's lectures last year proved so popular, that the course which was originally limited to 100, had to be increased to 150, and even then there was a long waiting list. This year the limit will again be placed at 150.

Mr. Remenyi is one of the keenest critics of contemporary European and American literature in these parts. We deem it a privilege to be able to present him again this year.
