Lecture Course

Ten more lectures are scheduled on our
Course which will be resumed Tuesday,
January 7th, with Bishop Francis J. Mc-
Connell, who will speak on “For What
Do We Live?”

The balance of the course includes a
debate between Maurice Samuel and
James Waterman Wise, on the timely sub-
ject “Is Modern Youth Irreligious?”; a
vocal recital by the world-famous Kedroff
Quartette; a Symposium on “Immortality
—is Death the End?”; and seven lectures.

will be Cantor Kantor and his Boys’ Choir
of the Jewish Center.

CHANUKAH CELEBRATIONS

IN THE HOME

Chanukah is a holiday rich in ceremonies, which can be practised in the home. It is needless to point out that Judaism can best be taught through doing, through active participation in ceremonial life. Here is what you can do at home:

1. If you have no Chanukah Menorah, get one at the temple office (15c each.) Every child in the school will receive a box of candles. Kindle the Chanukah candles every evening. The first candle is lit Thursday evening, December 26th, and add one light each night, through Thursday evening, January 2, when all eight candles are lit. (See Union Prayer Book page 351).

2. Sing the Chanukah songs which your child has learned in Sunday School.

3. Play the Dredel game. Your child who goes to Sunday School, knows how.

4. The Story of Chanukah may be read in "The Story of the Jewish People," by Jack Myers, Chapters 1, 2 and 3; in "Books of the Maccabees," especially chapter 4 in Book I and Chapter 1 in Book II; in Graetz's "History of the Jews," Volume I, chapters 21, 22 and 23. For further suggestions see our librarian.

IN THE TEMPLE

December 29th, 11:00 A. M., Children's Chanukah Service. The monthly Children's Service will take place on Shabbos Chanukah. A special service, with Chanukah as its theme, has been arranged by Mr. Brilliant for the occasion.

December 29th, 10:30 A. M.—Sunday morning lecture service. Subject: "Assimilation—Why Not?" There will be special music by the Choir.

IN THE SISTERHOOD

December 17th—Chanukah meeting. Monsieur Palliere, the French convert to Judaism, was the guest speaker at the Sisterhood Chanukah meeting held last Tuesday evening. The meeting was very well attended, and the men had an opportunity for observing some of the very excellent work that our Sisterhood is doing.

December 27th, 1:00 P. M.—Student Luncheon. Rabbi and Mrs. Brickner will have as their guests on Friday, December 27th, the out-of-town college students who are the children of our members, and who have returned to their homes for the Winter vacation.

Luncheon will be served by the Sisterhood in the Temple House Recreation Hall, and an interesting program, which will include the lighting of the Chanukah candles, is being prepared.

This is the fourth year that the Sisterhood Student Welfare Committee has co-operated with Rabbi and Mrs. Brickner in arranging a welcome-home luncheon for the out-of-town students.

IN THE ALUMNI

December 22nd, 8:30 P. M.—Intercollegiate Frolic. In addition to the regular program of dancing and entertainment, Rabbi Brickner will light the Chanukah candles which will be kept burning all evening, throughout the dancing.

IN THE RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

December 29th, 3:00 P. M.—Chanukah Play. "One Glorious Hour," a musical play, will be presented for the first time on any stage, by the children of our Religious School.

The children of the Primary and Intermediate Departments will be excused from their sessions on Sunday morning and will be required to come instead on Sunday afternoon at 2:30, when they will report to their classrooms. Attendance will be taken, and at the sound of the gong, the children will proceed to their regular seats in the Auditorium.

The Junior High Department will hold its sessions as usual on Saturday morning. All the children of this department will be given free tickets of admission to the play. Adults desiring to come, should obtain tickets from the office. There is no charge for admission, but tickets will be demanded at the door.

Every child in the Religious School participated in the Dredel Contest. Prizes will be awarded at the Chanukah Play.

Every child in the Religious School will receive a box of Chanukah candles this Sunday.

A Menorah-making contest was started two weeks ago. Mimeographed copies of instructions were distributed. All Menorahs must be in no later than December 29th. Prizes will be awarded at the Parent-Teachers' meeting in January.

In the classrooms the children have been kept busy making little Chanukah gifts for their parents.
