Next Sunday Rabbi Brickner will give a book review lecture. He will tell the story and analyze the problems raised by Ludwig Lewisohn in his most recent work "Mid-Channel," his sequel to "Upstream," and equally as interesting.

Lewisohn is one of the most brilliant odern literary figures. "Mid-Channel," modern literary figures.

like "Upstream," is autobiographical in character, and reveals the author in his attempt to "find" himself as a Jew. From "Upstream," to the Jewish "Island Within," Lewisohn finds himself again in "Mid-Channel."

In his last book he writes not only about the Jew and Jewishness, and his reactions to them, but also about America, Marriage and Divorce, and about great literary

figures whom he has met.
