November 12th—RABBI STEPHEN S. WISE.....

"THE PROBLEMS OF PALESTINE—PRESENT AND FUTURE"

What happened in Palestine is uppermost in the public mind. No better interpreter of this subject can be found in America than Dr. Wise who is recognized as the outstanding orator of America, and one of the great world Jewish leaders. He has just returned from abroad where he was an active participant in the events that transpired at the Zionist Congress.

November 19th—SARAH GERTRUDE MILLIN....."SPOUSES AND LOVERS"

Mrs. Millin, great English novelist and South Africa's foremost living writer, has chosen an intriguing subject for her visit to us. She comes to this country for a short lecture tour, and we are fortunate to be able to present her. "God's Stepchildren" which she wrote several years ago, has won her universal praise. Her recent novel "The Fiddler" is receiving universal comment. She is a woman of fascinating personality and an experienced lecturer.

November 26th—LOUIS PERSINGER.....VIOLIN RECITAL

When Louis Persinger was Concert-Meister of the San Francisco Orchestra, Yehudi Menuhin, then a baby, was first attracted to the man who became his teacher. Mr. Persinger, who is genuinely gifted and representative of contemporary artists, has been the soloist of the leading orchestras in this country. His recital here will be among his first in Cleveland.

**December 3rd—DEBATE: HINDUS vs. STODDARD....."RESOLVED:
THAT OUR PRESENT IMMIGRATION POLICY BE LIBERALIZED"**

America's immigration policy is intimately related to our national well-being. Whether our present policy of restricted immigration is for the best interests of the United States, is the point at issue.

Maurice Hindus, well known as a platform lecturer and contributor to America's leading periodicals, and of whom Glenn Frank said "you can almost hear his mind growing," will uphold the affirmative position.

Dr. Lothrop Stoddard, recognized authority on world affairs, and widely known as one of the leading advocates of the "Nordic Theory," will uphold the negative.

This debate will be more than a match of keen wits.

December 10th—RABBI SOLOMON GOLDMAN.....

"THE RELIGION OF THE MODERN MAN"

The subject which Rabbi Goldman has chosen for his first public re-appearance in Cleveland, is one that will attract us all. Rabbi Goldman is a fearless Liberal thinker in the field of religion. He will answer the question: Does a modern man need religion, and what should that religion be?

January 7th—BISHOP FRANCIS J. McCONNELL.."FOR WHAT DO WE LIVE?"

The Presidency of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ which comprises twenty-two million organized Protestants in America, is the highest honor in the gift of the American Protestant Church. This honor has been bestowed on Bishop Francis J. McConnell, of the New York area of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The Bishop is one of America's foremost Liberals, not only in the field of religion, but in social problems as well. He is a speaker of unusual power.

January 14th—PROF. WM. HUNG.....

"CHINA IN RELATION TO RUSSIA AND JAPAN"

The relations between China, Russia and Japan affect the world's peace. Revolutionary changes are taking place in that part of the world. Prof. Wm. Hung, a Chinaman, will interpret these changes. He is at present serving as visiting Professor at Harvard University, on leave from his chair at Yenching University. His address here last year before the Adult Education Association Institute won him many admirers.

January 21st—JOSEPH WOOD KRUTCH.....

"MODERN BIOGRAPHERS AND THEIR METHODS"

Biographies are proving best sellers. Ludwig, Strachey, Maurois and others, among whom is Joseph Wood Krutch, are the writers who have set the vogue for the modern interest in biography. H. L. Mencken said that Krutch's biography of Edgar Allen Poe "is the most intelligent and convincing account of this genius ever written." Mr. Krutch is also the author of "The Modern Temper" and is dramatic critic and associate editor of "The Nation."

January 28th—BEATRICE FORBES-ROBERTSON HALE.....

"CAN A MODERN WOMAN AFFORD A HUSBAND?"

Usually the question is "Can a Modern Man Afford a Wife?" but in these days of changing conceptions when women are coming into their own, Mrs. Beatrice Forbes-Robertson Hale raises the provoking problem "Can a Modern Woman Afford a Husband?" Her answer ought to be worthwhile, since she is a woman who has won distinction as author, actress and lecturer both in England and America. She speaks with authority, and with much grace and fascination.

February 4th—DR. DAVID SEABURY.....

"IF CHILDREN COULD CHOOSE THEIR PARENTS"

"Are you fit to be your children's parents?" is another way of phrasing the tantalizing subject which Dr. Seabury has chosen to discuss with us. He is one of the busiest consulting psychologists in New York City. His book "Growing Into Life," called the Magna Charta of youth, has been widely commented upon. He is a charming speaker known for his ability to be popular without being superficial.

February 11th—THE KEDROFF QUARTETTE.....VOCAL RECITAL

The world-famous Kedroff Quartette is the most distinguished ensemble of Russian singers. This unique organization has been together for some thirty years. They first came to America in January 1928. In their two seasons before the American public, they have won a triumph which rivals their music conquest of Europe. Their rendition of Russian and Slavic folk songs is an especially noteworthy part of their comprehensive repertoire.

February 18th—S. K. RATCLIFFE (M. P.).....

"THE RAMSAY MacDONALD GOVERNMENT"

What sort of a man is Ramsay MacDonald who is coming to America to negotiate with President Hoover, and what sort of a government is the Labor Government? Is it Socialistic, Communistic, or just a Reform Party? What are they likely to achieve? S. K. Ratcliffe, himself a Labor member of Parliament, and on the editorial staff of "The New Statesman," London's most influential English review, will give us his answer. Ratcliffe is one of the most popular English speakers on the American platform.

February 25th—SYMPOSIUM.....“IMMORTALITY—IS DEATH THE END?”

Bishop Warren Lincoln Rogers, Bishop Coadjutor of the Episcopal Church of the Diocese of Ohio; author and preacher.

James H. Rogers, noted American composer, and music critic of the Cleveland Plain Dealer; for forty-five years Organist and Choir Director of the Euclid Avenue Temple.

Prof. T. Wingate Todd, Director of Research Brush Foundation, and Professor of Anatomy at Western Reserve University.

Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner.

This will be a Symposium, not a Debate. Each of the speakers will give his personal conception and testimony of immortality. Bishop Rogers will speak the view of the churchman; Mr. Rogers will present his testimony as a confirmed Spiritualist; Prof. Todd will give his view as a quiet and modest witness to the power of the conception of Immortality as a motive to the physician and scientist; Rabbi Brickner will speak as the Liberal and Modernist.

March 4th—DR. JULIUS KLEIN.....“CHAIN STORES AND MERGERS”

Does the small merchant have any future, in the face of the chain stores and mergers, and are we all likely to become the future employees of the large corporations? Dr. Julius Klein who comes to us to speak on this subject, is America's foremost business authority. He is at present the U. S. A. Assistant Secretary of Commerce at Washington, and has in the past occupied strategically important positions in the determination of America's business and foreign economic policy.

**March 11th—DEBATE: SAMUEL vs. WISE“.....
“IS MODERN YOUTH IRRELIGIOUS?”**

Maurice Samuel's position as one of the most brilliant intellectual forces in the literary world has been recently equalled by his enormous success and popularity as public speaker. Profoundness of thought, brilliant writing and utter fearlessness of original opinion won success for Mr. Samuel's books, among which are: “You Gentiles,” “The Outsider,” “I, the Jew.”

James Waterman Wise, the gifted son of Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, is the author of “Jews are Like That” and other books. In the last few years he has made an exhaustive study of the Youth Movement in America and abroad, and is well qualified to speak expertly on the youth of today.
