Dr. Sheldon H. Blank

We regret very much that owing to a severe case of laryngitis, Prof. Jacob Marcus will be unable to be with us during the Yom Kippur Services. His place will be taken by Rev. Dr. Sheldon H. Blank, Instructor in Hebrew Language and Bible at the Hebrew Union College.

Dr. Blank is a graduate of the Hebrew Union College in the class of 1923, and took his Ph.D. degree in Germany. He is a scholar and an excellent speaker.

We are indeed very grateful to him for consenting to come in Dr. Marcus' stead. We trust that Dr. Marcus will have a speedy recovery. We shall miss him.

Shabbath Shubah

The Sabbath preceding Yom Kippur is known as The Sabbath of Repentance. It derives its name from the Haftarah of that day (Hosea XIV, 2-10) which begins with the word "Shubah"—Return, i. e. Repent.

Rosh Hashonah Services

The services on Rosh Hashonah, both in the temple and in the auditorium, were the most impressive that we have ever had. The decorum was perfect. Huge throngs filled both places of worship. The choirs, under the direction of Mr. James

H. Rogers and Mr. Vincent Percy, rendered the service most beautifully. Especially impressive were the new and melodious selections which were introduced for the first time this year.

The choirs' program for Yom Kippur includes many traditional Jewish selections never before rendered in the Reform service.

The temple was filled to overflowing on Saturday afternoon with children and their parents. A spirit of reverence pervaded the service. The Children's Choir led in the singing of the responses which were joined in by the whole congregation. The adult and children's services were truly inspiring.

Kol Nidre Services

The evening service of Yom Kippur gets its traditional name on account of the rendition of the Kol Nidre. This prayer and its haunting melody are so dear to the heart of the Jew, that it has been re-introduced into our service.

Next Sunday evening, an old custom of the traditional Synagogue will be introduced into our worship. The Kol Nidre melody, familiar to the ears of many past generations, will be rendered as a cello solo, the Ark will be opened, the elders of the congregation will mount the pulpit and receive the Scrolls of the Law from the hands of the Rabbi. With the congregation standing, the Choir will render the Kol Nidre.

The reason for this innovation is to bring back into the Reform service, more of the emotional warmth that was to be found in the traditional Synagogue.

SISTERHOOD

Succoth - Opening Meeting

Mr. Marcel Salzinger and **Mr. Josef Fuchs** will be the guest artists, and **Mrs. Maurice Steinfeld**, President of the National Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, will be the guest speaker at the **Opening Meeting of the Sisterhood Tuesday afternoon, October 22nd.**

Mr. Salzinger, formerly leading baritone of the Royal Opera House in Berlin, is now head of the Voice Department of the Cleveland Institute of Music. He has sung in practically all of the big music centers of Europe, and was at one time manager of his own company in Czecho-Slovakia. **Mr. Salzinger** will give a program of vocal selections which will include the interpretation of German Lieder for which he has become particularly noted.

Mr. Fuchs came to Cleveland about four years ago from New York City, to be Concert Meister of the Cleveland Orchestra. He comes from a musical family, and has achieved a reputation both as composer and violinist. He has prepared an excellent program of violin selections for the occasion.

The meeting is open only to members of the Sisterhood.

"Books and Authors"

Mr. Joseph Remenyi will begin his third year of lectures on "**Modern Books and Their Authors**" which he will give on alternate Friday mornings from 11 to 12 o'clock beginning with **Friday, October 25th.**

Mr. Remenyi, who is Instructor of Literature at Cleveland College, and Editor of the Szabadtag—the Cleveland Hungarian newspaper, is one of the keenest critics in contemporary European literature in these parts. We deem it a privilege to be able to present him again this year.

Mr. Peter Witt, who needs no introduction to any Cleveland audience, will be the speaker at the first Forum Supper conducted by the Alumni Association, in co-operation with the High School Department, Sunday evening, November 3rd.

The evening will begin with a supper and entertainment. Mr. Witt will then speak, and following his talk, there will be a dance.

Admission for the supper and dance will be 75c. Those holding budget tickets will be admitted free of charge.

Alumni plans for the year include two Forum Supper Dances, an Intercollegiate Frolic, a Spring Dance and two plays by the Dramatic Group. The total cost, by single admission, for these affairs exceeds five dollars. Those holding budget tickets are admitted to all, and in addition, they were entitled to seats for the High Holy Days, and membership in the Alumni. Budget tickets may still be purchased at three dollars each, at the temple office.

Succoth Offerings

Children are requested to bring their Succoth offerings of corn, wheat, fruits, vegetables, autumn leaves, etc., on Sunday morning. Only non-perishable offerings should be brought this Sunday morning. Further offerings may be brought Wednesday or Thursday. The Sukkah will be decorated on Friday.

Isaac M. Wise Plaque

The confirmation class of 1928 presented to the temple, in honor of Rabbi Brickner, an Isaac M. Wise Memorial Plaque made in the Bezalel School of Palestine. The plaque has just been hung in the lobby of the Temple House.

Special Hebrew

All classes for special Hebrew work will meet for the first time this Saturday and Sunday. The enlargement of the Hebrew Department has been entered into, in order to give those children who have a special aptitude for Hebrew, additional opportunities for pursuing their studies in this language. Children of the IV, V and VI grades will meet for the first time Sunday morning October 13th; those in the VII, VIII and IX grades will meet for the first time Saturday morning October 12th. Children who have not been selected, but who wish to join these classes, should apply to Mr. Brilliant.
