### Succoth

The Succoth Festival will be inaugurat-  
ed with services on Friday, October 18th  
at 5:30 P. M., and Saturday, October 19th  
at 10:30 A. M. Rabbi Brickner will speak  
at the morning service.

Succoth commemorates the Feast of In-  
gathering which our people celebrated in  
Palestine, and also stands for the Jewish  
Feast of Thanksgiving. It is a festival  
marked with the spirit of joy and glad-  
ness. The symbols of the Festival are  
the Succah, the ethrog and the lulav.

As usual, the temple pulpit will be  
transformed by the Sisterhood, into a  
beautiful Succah decorated with evergreen,  
flowers and fruits of the Harvest season.

The concluding day of Succoth falls on  
Saturday, October 26th.

### New Succoth Ceremonies

On the last day of Succoth, Saturday,  
October 26th, a new initiation ceremony  
will be introduced into the service.

In keeping with the spirit of the day,  
the children who have just entered the  
first grade, will take part in a ceremony  
that will symbolize their entrance into  
the studies of our Torah and tradition.

The day is known in Jewish tradition  
as Simchath Torah—rejoicing over the  
Torah. The ceremony will include a sym-  
bolization of the carrying on of tradition  
from generation to generation.

The climax of the service will be the  
procession of the little first-graders and  
their impressive pledge to the teachings  
of Judaism.

It is confidently expected that these ex-  
ercises will in time become as beautiful  
and as integral a part of our temple life,  
as confirmation. All temple members are  
strongly urged to be present at this service.

Dr. Scott, who is Professor of Clinical Medicine at the Medical School of Western Reserve University, and Physician-in-chief at the City Hospital, will represent the medical profession in the Symposium.

Mr. Day, a member of an illustrious family of jurists, is at the present time acting as a special Prosecutor of the Attorney-General's office, conducting the trial of the vote fraud cases in this county. Mr. Day has never held public office, but has been active in a number of civic movements, and is an important factor in the Cleveland Bar Association. Mr. Day will speak for law as a profession.

As head of the biggest business in Cleveland, there is no one better fitted to talk for Business, than City Manager Hopkins.

The Rabbinate as a vocation will be discussed by Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner, one of the leading liberal thinkers in this field.

A program of music and entertainment is being planned, in addition to the Symposium, and refreshments will be served. The meeting will be open to members of the Men's Club, their sons of post-confir-mation age, and their friends.
