“Strange Interlude” Next Sunday

“Strange Interlude” will be Rabbi Brickner's text for next Sunday's lecture.

This greatest play of America's foremost dramatist, is not only unique in its technique and form, but its contents are profound.

One of the dramatic critics has characterized the play very aptly, as follows:

“The design is vast. Nothing less than all of life is what O'Neill is attempting to cage in this play, not the surface of life but the heart and beat of life, its soul secret, its unuttered thought, its torment and confusion, its baffling inexplicability, its strange psychological aberrations, its conscious and unconscious desires, its gods and philosophies and strange fatefulness—in short the whole twisted and bizarre and mysterious fabric of the earthly globe reflected and refined through the troubled temperament of a poet.”

Rabbi Brickner will interpret the meaning of the play, and discuss the spiritual and moral problems which are implied in it.

Rabbi's Radio Message
