In a summary of the year's activities, the chairman pointed out that the Round Table had held eighteen sessions, fourteen of which had been personally conducted by Rabbi Brickner. Prominent guest speakers held three of the sessions in the Rabbi's absence, and another one of the Round Tables featured a debate on "The Chain Store." In addition to the increase

in average attendance this year over former years, there were a larger number of members who attended the Round Table meetings regularly, than ever before. Members have frequently taken occasion to bring their friends and business associates to the meetings. A large variety of subjects were discussed, and aroused keen interest and very lively discussions.

The coincidence of the day on which the Round Table and the Lecture Course met, made possible the invitation as guests of such prominent personalities as Aaron Sapiro, Stephen S. Wise, Maurice Hindus, Solomon Goldman, Wm. Hung and James Waterman Wise.

The Round Table is an institution of public discussion, unique in its way not only in our congregation but in Cleveland, and it has been copied by Men's Clubs all over the country.

It will resume sessions again early next Fall.
