Memorial (Yizkor) Service, Saturday

On Saturday, April 19th, the last day of Passover, we will reintroduce as part of the service, the beautiful custom of memorializing our beloved departed.

This change is in keeping with Rabbi Brickner's policy of bringing back the many traditionally beautiful and significant customs, and thereby bringing back to the temple some of the lost warmth and meaning.

Thus we brought back last Yom Kippur the traditional Kol Nidre ceremony, and on the last day of Succoth we introduced for the first time the Consecration Service which initiated the children who began the study of Judaism in our Religious School.

A special Memorial Service has been prepared, which will be distributed to the members as they enter the temple.

Rabbi Brickner urges upon the members to revive the custom of memorializing their dear beloved, and to attend services on the 7th day of Passover—Saturday, April 19th, at 10 A. M. (Please note hour).

Sunday Lecture Service

Man has ever cherished the immortal hope that the grave is not the end, and that death can be conquered.

All religions are based on certain dogmas and beliefs which aim to soothe and comfort man's aching heart, and to answer the insistent queries of his Reason, touching the most profound of all mysteries.

At this season of the year, the thoughts of millions of people center on this subject. The Rabbi will also refer to Eugene O'Neill's great play "Lazarus Laughed."

A special Children's Service is being prepared which will be conducted entirely by members of the clubs. Then there will be a catered luncheon, served in the Recreation Hall, for the club members and their parents, following which a special entertainment will be given, including a private showing of a movie reel.

Under the able supervision of Mrs. S. Braverman, the Club Department now numbers over two hundred children. The work of the clubs is planned not only to supplement the Religious School, but has become an integral part of the school curriculum.

The Dramatic Groups on Drama Day gave performances which were entirely Jewish in nature; the Arts and Crafts and the Marionette Clubs have utilized the Jewish motif in all of their work; and the same strain runs through the activities of all the other clubs. With Club Day, a successful season of activity is being concluded.

R. E. A. Convention April 23rd-25th
