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### Shabbath Shubah

The Sabbath preceding Yom Kippur is known as The Sabbath of Repentance. It derives its name from the Haftorah of that day (Hosea XIV, 2-10) which begins with the word "Shubah"—Return, i. e. Repent.

### The Kol Nidre Service

The evening service of Yom Kippur gets its traditional name on account of the rendition of the Kol Nidre. This prayer and its haunting melody are so dear to the heart of the Jew, that it was re-introduced into our service last year.

This innovation brought back into our service, more of the emotional warmth that was to be found in the traditional Synagog. At the convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis last June, it was decided to include the Kol Nidre in the new Hymnal which will be published shortly.

Next Wednesday evening the Kol Nidre melody, familiar to the ears of many past generations, will be rendered as a solo. The Ark will be opened, and the elders of the congregation will mount the pulpit to receive the Scrolls of the Law from the hands of the Rabbi. With the congregation standing, the choir will render the Kol Nidre.

### Please Note

Members are expected to present their cards of admission at each service. There will be no admission without a card.

Members are also requested to come on time, and it is hoped that everyone will be seated when services begin.

The names of dear ones who have passed away since last Yom Kippur, will be read at the Memorial Service on Yom Kippur afternoon. These names must be sent to the Temple office no later than Tuesday, September 30th.

### Children's Yom Kippur Service

All the children of the Religious School are required to attend the Yom Kippur Service which will be held in the Temple on Thursday, October 2nd at 1:15 P. M. Members of the 1930 confirmation class will participate in the service.

### Succoth

Services for the Succoth Festival will be held on Tuesday, October 7th at 10:30 A. M. The Concluding Succoth Service and Consecration Ceremony will be held on Tuesday, October 14th.

#### Succoth - Opening Meeting

## GLEANNINGS

### The Hitler Victory

Increased world-wide persecution of the Jews is predicted by the London Express in connection with the victory of Adolf Hitler, the notorious anti-Semitic National Socialist in Germany's Reichstag elections.

The Jewish Daily Bulletin summarizes the Hitler program: "first that all Jews who settled in Germany since August 2nd, 1914, should be expelled; and secondly, that Jews should be excluded from responsible posts in public life. Hitler considers as Jews, all persons whose ancestors practised the Mosaic faith on March 11th, 1852.

"Hitler also intends to seek a ban on Jews in the German army and navy, making them pay instead a special defense tax.

"If Hitler's program is carried out, Jews will not be admitted to the universities. Newspapers employing Jews, or which are owned by Jews, will have to state that fact on a front-page headline together with a representation of the Mogen David, the Star of David. He will also seek to prohibit the sale of land to Jews and to prevent them from teaching in the public schools."

Many German-Jewish leaders, headed by Professor Einstein, urge the Jews not to despair over the Hitler victory. Dr. Einstein believes that the Hitler vote is only a symptom of momentary resentment caused by economic misery and unemployment and not necessarily of anti-Jewish hatred.

### Habimah and Shakespeare

The world-famous Habimah Players scored a tremendous success in Berlin upon the occasion of their first performance of Shakespeare's "As You Like It" in the translation of S. Chernichovsky, famous Hebrew poet.

### American Aid Needed

The need for the continuance of financial assistance by the Jews of the United States for their needy brethren in Poland, Roumania, Russia and other countries in Eastern Europe, as well as for translating the hopeful and optimistic outlook in Palestine into reality in order to lay a safe foundation for the Jews there and their progress in the future, is emphasized by Felix M. Warburg, noted American philanthropist, in an interview here today with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency.

Mr. Warburg declared that "the need for the continuance of American aid for our people abroad is so clearly apparent that I am convinced that if the additional knowledge that I have acquired since I have been abroad could be brought home to our friends in America, their financial aid would be forthcoming more quickly and more generously than has thus far met the efforts of the Allied Jewish Campaign."

The Allied Jewish Campaign is seeking \$6,000,000 in the United States for the needy Jews in Eastern Europe and for the upbuilding of Palestine.

Two public high schools in New York City are now giving Hebrew instruction as an elective course. More students have already registered than can be accommodated.

### When Giving is Hard

"The real test of people's characters, their interest and their social responsibility comes when giving is going to be a little hard, is going to mean looking over a budget that has become a little constricted, and where there must be a choice not between making this contribution and investing a little less this year, but between making this contribution and spending less in certain other ways."
