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#### **Consecration** Service

Coupled with Simchath Torath, we will hold the Consecration Service on the Concluding Day of Succoth, Tuesday, October 14th at 10:30 A. M.

The beautiful ceremony of consecration was introduced for the first time last year, and has already taken its place with confirmation as a significant event in the life of the child.

The ceremony will center around the consecration of the little children who enter the first grade of the Religious School.

They will march into the Temple to a tune especially written for the occasion. Miniature Torahs will be presented to them and the Rabbi will bless them.

As an additional part of the ceremonial, three generations reared in the Temple grandfather, father and son,—will receive the Scrolls from the Rabbi and hand them over, one to the other, to symbolize the transmitting of the Torah from generation to generation.

Parents are strongly urged to bring their children with them.

#### MEN'S CLUB

#### "Unemployment — Is there a Cure?

On Tuesday evening, October 21st, the Men's Club is planning to hold a public discussion on the question of "Unemployment."

Participating in the discussion there will be a prominent banker to present the financial aspect of the question; a wellknown minister for the ethical side, a prominent employer of labor to present that aspect and an outstanding labor leader to present the side for Organized Labor. An opportunity will be given to those present to ask questions in open forum fashion.

A discussion of this nature is both timely and essential so that the minds of people may be focused on a constructive way out of our depression.

#### Owen D. Young on Unemployment

In a recent address to the National Electric Light Association of San Francisco, Mr. Owen D. Young said:

"It is ridiculous to speak of unemployment as a necessary condition of human society. It is nothing more than a maladjustment of its machinery. It is a blot on our intelligence. It is a drain on our sympathy. It is a promoter of charity which affects disadvantageously both those who give and those who receive. Some day we shall learn to do better, butwe must learn it soon."

He also makes a plea, in the same address, for constructive relations between nations in the exchange of their surpluses:

"How can we market these surpluses, both agricultural and industrial? The method is well known. Those who need our goods are the potential buyers. One cultivates his potential buyers. He does not rebuff them. He seeks their friendship and their goodwill. If they need credit, he extends it. If they have goods which he can take in exchange without curtailing the business of his own country, he makes it a point to take them.

"... How can we market our agricultural or industrial surplus to the world so long as we act on the principle that we are not interested in the welfare of anyone but ourselves? ... Isolation in our politics, exclusion in our tariff, means that we will retain as a just penalty to our littleness the surpluses which we might otherwise market to the peoples of the world, and which, so long as they stay with us, destroy our prosperity."

#### Kiddush in Succah

Every child in the school will have an opportunity of visiting the Succah in the Recreation Hall on either Saturday or Sunday. During their visit, Rabbi Brickner will recite the Kiddush, and refreshments will be served to the children through the courtesy of the Sisterhood.

Children are expected to observe the holidays by staying away from public school on Tuesday, October 14th, and parents are urged to bring their children with them to the Consecration Ceremony on that day.

#### The Hias

The Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America (HIAS), continue to be in receipt of messages from Jewish leaders in Europe as well as in South American countries urging it not to curtail its work, which possibility is threatened by reason of the fact that it has a deficit of \$150,000 and is in urgent need of funds to wipe out this as well as to raise \$400,000 for its current work.

J. Rosenblatt, President of the Jewish Community of Uruguay, in his message says: "The Jewish community of Uruguay is deeply shocked at news that Hias is suspending its contribution thanks to which Jewish immigration to Uruguay has developed during the past years. Without the help of Hias we are unable to aid these immigrants to establish themselves. We plead with American Jewry to support Hias enabling us to save thousands of more Jewish families who can make peaceful honest livings in our country?"

The Ezra Society of Antwerp cables: "Our situation is critical. Cannot help emigrants unless Hias continues support."

From Rotterdam the Montefiore Society says: "Greatly moved by critical situation of your Society. Work of our organization is threatened."

Hias rendered immigrant aid service to 35,000 Jewish immigrants from Eastern Europe who were settled in Argentina, Brazil, Uruguay, Australia, South Africa, Cuba and France.
