# SCANNING THE NEWS

Cleveland: On Wednesday, November 12th at 2:30 P. M. in Halle's Tearoom, the Cleveland Chapter of Hadassah will hold its annual ingathering of linens for Palestine hospitals. The need for sheets in the Hadassah hospitals is very urgent.

Cleveland: The opening session of the Jewish Teachers' Institute for the school year 1930-31 was held Tuesday afternoon, October 21st. Courses in Jewish studies are offered to all graduates of congregational high schools. Sessions are held every Tuesday and Thursday afternoons from 4:30 to 6:00 o'clock, at The Temple (E. 105th and Ansel Rd.).

Cleveland: The recent paintings and etchings of Edwin Kaufman, Kalman Kabinyi and Sylvia Saut will be on view at the Council Educational Alliance, 13512 Kinsman Road, November 1st to 17th from 2 to 10 P. M.

St. Louis: We reprint with pleasure the following taken from the editorial page of the St. Louis "Post-Dispatch" of Sunday morning, October 12th: "In Germany during the First Crusade, in the year 1096, a community of Jews, fearful of violence and sudden death, took refuge in a Christian Church. The Soldiers of the Cross battered down the door, violated the sanctuary and slaughtered them all all, that is, but those who slew themselves and their loved ones to escape the Christian touch.

"In Frankfort-on-Main the other day, not far from the scene of this ancient massacre, 30 Christians—Steel Helmets often given to outraging the Jews—were attacked by Communists and driven to refuge in a Jewish Synagogue. The Jews hid their enemies from the mob and called the police to rescue them." We reprint this editorial, not only because it tells how a group of Jews practiced the finest teachings of Judaism—"When thine enemy be hungry, give him food to eat; when he be thirsty, give him water to drink" but also because it is a fine religious expression on the part of the Christian editor who wrote it.—(Bulletin Exchange.)

Rome: A monument will be erected here to the memory of Moses Romano, Italian Jewish soldier recently killed on the Serbian frontier. He has been proclaimed a national hero.—(The Jewish Standard.) New York: Congressman Samuel Dickstein accused Congress of inhumanity because it failed to provide for the admission into the United States, outside the regular immigration quota, of persons over fifty-five years of age who are parents of American citizens and who because of their age cannot compete economically with American labor.—(The Jewish Standard.)

Warsaw: It is generally believed by observers that the Jews of Poland, as a minority political entity, will suffer their greatest downfall in the coming elections. Effort to present a united Jewish ticket have been frustrated by Dr. Isaac Gruenbaum, President of the Polish Zionist Federation, through his refusal to include the Agudath Israel in a united Jewish party."—(The Jewish Standard.)

Cincinnati: Dr. Julian Morgenstern, President of the Hebrew Union College, declared at the fifty-fifth opening exercises of the College, that both Zionism and Reform Judaism are indispensable to Judaism and that world Jewry must leave unreasoning partisanship for the path of true vision.—(The Jewish Standard.)

Montreal: The bill which gives Jews the right to have their own school system, in Montreal, is being fought by the Mayor of the city in the hope of its repeal.— (Bullein Exchange.)

England: Lord Reading, most prominent Jew in England, whose real name is Daniel Rufus Isaacs, recently celebrated his seventieth birthday.—(Bulletin Exchange.)

Australia: Rabbi Jerome Mark is continuing to create excitement with his teaching of Progressive Judaism in the conservative atmosphere of Melbourne, Australia.—(Bulletin Exchange.)

Germany: Not all supposed Fascists are in favor of the Hitler program with its keynote of anti-Semitism, as is evidenced by the counsel given by Lord Rothermore that anti-Semitism be eliminated from the Hitler program because Jew-baiting is a stupid survival of medieval prejudice.—(Bulletin Exchange.)
