### Mary Wigman Makes Cleveland Debut on Our Course

Mary Wigman, the world's greatest dancer, who, critics believe, surpasses even the late Isadora Duncan, will make her debut in Cleveland under our auspices. She was the sensation of New York last season.

Her appearance will mark an outstanding event on our Course, which also includes Isa Kremer, internationally famous balladist and singer of folk songs; and Toscha Seidel, violinist who has been heard frequently over a coast-to-coast network.

The Course this year also presents two significant public discussions on "Will Religion Disappear?" and "How to Face Life," and five lectures.

A book of tickets for the entire series, including the two discussions, five lectures, and three entertainment features will be \$3.50. Single admissions for the three entertainment features alone, amount to \$3.50. It pays to become a subscriber.

### The Kol Nidre Service

The evening service of Yom Kippur gets its traditional name on account of the rendition of the Kol Nidre. This prayer and its haunting melody are so dear to the heart of the Jew, that it was reintroduced into the service last year.

This innovation brought back into our service, more of the emotional warmth that was to be found in the traditional Synagog. At the convention of the Central Conference of American Rabbis last year, it was decided to include the Kol Nidre in the new Hymnal which will be published shortly.

Next Monday evening the Kol Nidre melody, familiar to the ears of many past generations, will be rendered as a solo. The Ark will be opened, and the elders of the congregation will mount the pulpit to receive the Scrolls of the Law from the hands of the Rabbi. With the congregation standing, the choir will render the Kol Nidre.
