Self Control

One of the objects of the perfect Law is to make man reject, disregard, and reduce his desires as much as possible. For it is well known that intemperate indulgence of our appetites hinders the ulterior perfection of man, impedes his development, disturbs the social order of the country, and the economy of the family; it causes an increase of envy, hatred, and warfare. God in His wisdom, has therefore given us such commandments as would counteract excessive desires and lustings.

Most of all, the Law is intended to give its followers purity and holiness.

Cleanliness in dress and body, by washing and removing of impurities is enjoined by the law; but it must be connected with purity of action, and with a heart free from low principles and bad habits. It would be extremely bad for man to content himself with a purity obtained by washing and cleanliness in dress and toilet, and be at the same time voluptuous and unrestrained in eating, drinking, and other gratifications of the senses.
