Rabbi Bernstein at Youth Temple Friday, February 19th

Although but a young man of 30 years of age, Rabbi Bernstein is a graduate of the Jewish Institute of Religion, has pursued graduate studies at Columbia University, at the University of Cambridge in England and the Hebrew University in Palestine and has made frequent contributions to some of America's leading periodicals such as Harper's and The Nation.

Rabbi Bernstein in selecting his subject warns us that his address will be far from an old-fashioned patriotic message. He is a pacifist and is critical of what many people call patriotism.

He also gave a series of lectures before the Michigan State Teachers' College.
