# "THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE MINISTRY TO PUBLIC AFFAIRS"

Friday Evening Twilight Service, 5:30 to 6:00 Sabbath Morning Service, 11:00 to 12:00

When the pulpit speaks out on Politics, Economics, Business and other so-called "non-religious" subjects, is it "meddling" in fields that it should let alone?

Should the ministry confine itself strictly to religious matters in the traditionally accepted sense of this term?

There is considerable difference of opinion among ministers and lay people on these points.

Next Sunday morning, Rabbi Brickner will deal with this question and endeavor to present both sides and give his own views.

This will be the last Sunday morning lecture service for the season.

The attendances this season have been extremely large. The services have attracted many non-members of the congregation. It is hoped that the attendance next Sunday will be a fitting climax to this season's services.

The Friday evening twilight service from 5:30 to 6:00 and the Sabbath morning service at 11 o'clock will continue as usual. The Rabbi conducts both of these services and will continue to preach Sabbath mornings until the Sabbath after Shavuoth.

During the summer Rabbi Brickner will have an assistant who will conduct the religious services Friday evenings and Saturday mornings. These services will continue with full choir throughout the summer.

#### Learn Hebrew Through Play

A Hebrew Movable Alphabet made out of wood for children to play with as toys is one of the newest methods by which children may learn to read and speak Hebrew. This alphabet has been patented by Benjamin Delegator, of Cincinnati.

While this is the first Hebrew alphabet of its kind to be made available in America, Mr. Delegator has been using this system for the past twenty years in the instruction of Hebrew in Europe. At one time he found it possible to teach a group of 70 children at once by this method and hold the interest of the entire group at the same time.

The letters, which Mr. Delegator makes himself, are used by the children as toys. They learn the different letters by placing them under toy animals. Mr. Delegator has found that by making a game out of this study, it has been possible to teach children to read, form words, and speak Hebrew in from two to three months. The alphabet may also be used to teach children grammar, the declension of nouns, verbs. etc.

Mr. Delegator has also invented a lotto game which may be played with the Hebrew letters and which is also played like a cross-word puzzle.

For the past eight years, Mr. Delegator has been living in the United States. He was a Hebrew instructor in the Rochester Orphans' Home for three years; in the Cincinnati Bureau of Jewish Education for one year, and in the Cincinnati Yeshiva Etz Chaim. Previous to coming to America, he was an instructor in Odessa.

The Hebrew alphabet is available at the Cincinnati office of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.

#### J. T. I. Holds Graduation

Mr. Nathan Brilliant will deliver the commencement address at the Graduation Exercises of the Jewish Teachers Institute, Sunday evening, May 22nd in the Gries Memorial Chapel of The Temple. The Jewish Teachers' Institute is the training school for religious school teachers and is conducted by the Bureau of Jewish Education.

#### National Council for Jewish Education

The seventh annual conference of the National Council for Jewish Education will this year be held in Philadelphia, May 15th, 16th and 17th. An exhibit of recent educational materials in which the Euclid Avenue Temple is well represented will be on display throughout the conference.

The National Council for Jewish Education is composed of the Executive Directors of the Bureaus of Jewish Education throughout the United States and other professional Jewish educators in charge of large school systems. Only those who have made Jewish education a profession are eligible for membership. Our Educational Director, Mr. Nathan Brilliant, is a member of this body.

Rabbi Brickner was for many years a member of the Executive Staff of the Bureau of Jewish Education of New York, and one of the original members of the group associated with Dr. S. Benderley.
