# CONGREGATIONAL ANNUAL MEETING

The Eighty-sixth annual meeting of our congregation Anshe Chesed, the oldest Jewish congregation in Cleveland, was held last Sunday evening. Close to 400 members attended.

Mr. Marcus L. Aaron of Pittsburgh was the guest speaker. Rabbi Brickner concluded the meeting.

Mr. Irwin Loeser, in his annual report showed that the membership had increased this past year by about fifty. He appealed for continued support of the Temple. He said every effort would be made to keep the activities of the Temple unimpaired in order to aid the morale of its members in these times.

Mr. Maurice Bernon, chairman of the Religious School committee, indicated in his report that not only was our school one of the largest in the country but that because of its outstandingly progressive spirit numerous letters from all over the country have been received, asking for information concerning curricula and other materials created here.

Reports of activities were made by the respective presidents of the Sisterhood and the Men's Club. Mrs Milton M. Halle and Mr. Otto J. Zinner. Mr. Ben Sinks reported for U. A. H. C.

The musical program was presented by Mr. Maurice Goldman and Miss Tillie Schenker of our Temple Choir Miss Miriam Nagusky, violinist, and our High School Orchestra directed by Miss Leah Jaffa.

## PRAYER BOOK FUND

The Aristocratic Derivation of the Name "Cohen."

"Emanuel Voltaire Cohen, a youth nineteen years of age, by means of his father's petition under Civil Rights Law of New York (60 et seq.,), sought to have his name changed to Emanuel Voltaire Conason. Petitioner alleged his desire to enter as a student in a famous old New England university, legally tagged as Conason, because 'the name of Cohen is un-American.'

"Mr. Justice Levy of the Supreme Court of New York, Special Term, New York County, granted the application on the condition that the petitioner delete the foregoing quoted expression as being offensive and then resubmit the petition for approval (In re Cohen 55 New York Supplement, 616).

"The learned Justice pointed out that the allegation that the name 'Cohen' was un-American, 'must be considered an affront... to the many distinguished Americans who have borne and still bear this name, among them a former, as well as a present justice of this very court.'

"The opinion quotes the statement of the great New England poet, Holmes: 'Fate tried to conceal him by naming him Smith,' and states that 'many a distinguished American by that name has refused to stay concealed. In the case of 'Cohen', fate reveals rather than conceals. name is the transliteration in English of the generic Hebrew word for the priests of the temple . . . It signifies that the bearer is most probably a descendant of that class, and in a sense constitutes a badge or title of nobility. It is doubly strange that petitioner who intends to dwell in the select New England circles should desire to conceal his aristocratic Old Testament origin among the people whose first names show the marked influence of Old Testament appellations and many of whose picturesque and non-Anglo-Saxon given or Christian names wil! tend to recall to him the atmosphere in which was born the name from which he now seeks to escape . . . Let him not, however, again make reference to an honored name by calling it un-American.' "

## School Conducts Social Service Project

It is hoped that with the cooperation of the parents this project will bring into the lives of the children in the Sabbath School splendid attitude and a generous spirit.
