CHANUKAH CELEBRATIONS

In the Home

Chanukah is a holiday rich in ceremonies, which can be practised in the home. It is needless to point out that Judaism can best be taught through doing, through active participation in ceremonial life.

Here is what you can do at home:

1. If you have no Chanukah Menorah, get one at the Temple Gift Shop (15c each). Every child in the school has received a box of candles. Kindle the Chanukah candles every evening. The first Chanukah light is lit Friday evening, December 23rd. Add one candle each night through Friday evening, December 30th, when all eight candles are lit. (See Union Prayer Book, page 351).

2. Sing the Chanukah songs which your child has learned in the Religious School.

3. Arrange for Chanukah parties. A pamphlet entitled "Chanukah Parties" prepared by Mrs. Braverman and Mr. Brilliant is available at the Gift Shop for 15 cents each. It contains a wealth of material on the organization of the party, many new Chanukah games and suggestions. There are also a number of recipes for Chanukah cookies and other dainties as well as poems and music.

4. The story of Chanukah may be read. Consult Miss Wolpaw, our librarian, for references.

In The Temple

At all of the services during the Chanukah week, the choir will render special Chanukah music.

At the Friday evening services, December 23rd and 30th, Chanukah candles will be lit.

December 25th—9:45 a. m.—Chanukah Assembly of the combined Primary and Intermediate Departments (Kindergarten through the Sixth Grade).

The classrooms reflect the Chanukah spirit through room decorations. The children are not only given the Chanukah story and Chanukah customs but are engaged in making original little gifts for their parents and friends.

In addition, the entire school is participating in a Social Service project in cooperation with the Jewish Social Service Bureau. A basket of necessities from each class prepared for a special family will be sent to the Bureau.

In the clubs parties are being held. They are also participating in the kindling of Lights every evening.

HOME SERVICE FOR CHANUKAH

Before kindling the lights the following Blessings are said:

Baw-ruch ataw a-do-noy, e-lo-he-nu me-lech haw-o-lum, a-sher kid-d'shaw-nu b'mits'-vo-sov v'tsi-vaw-nu l'had-lik ner shel chan-nu-kah.

Blessed art Thou, O Lord our God, King of the universe, who hast sanctified us by thy commandments, and commanded us to kindle the light of Chanukah.

Baw-ruch ataw a-do-noy, e-lo-he-nu me-lech haw-o-lum, she-aw-saw nissim la-avo-se-nu ba-yaw-mim haw-hame baz'-z'man haz-zeh.

Blessed art Thou O Lord our God, King of the universe who wroughtest miracles for our fathers in days of old, at this season.

Prayer after lighting the lights: We thank Thee, O God, for the wonders Thou didst do for our fathers in the days of the Maccabees. They were Thy priests, struggling for the triumph of the light and the right and though they were few in number, Thou didst help them to win the victory. Let us learn well the lesson of our festival of Lights, that not through great might, nor yet by large numbers, does man prevail, but rather by the Spirit of Truth and Right, yea, by the Spirit of God. May we keep these lights as sacred symbols of the great deliverance, that we may look upon them, and remind ourselves of the great truths of our religion, and of the heroism with which our fathers fought for the defense of these truths. And may Thy Spirit abide with us through life. Amen.
