Have You Read These?

From Haman to Hitler

The success of Hitler and the occasion of our observance of the downfall of Haman make timely a consideration of the similarity that stamps the two demagogues as of the same mold.

Like Hitler, Haman had risen to high political position . . . "After these things did the king promote Haman and advanced him, and set his seat above all the princes that were with him."

Haman made the destruction of the Jews a national policy of his administration . . . "Haman sought to destroy all the Jews that were throughout the whole kingdom of Ahaseurus, even the people of Mordecai."

Strikingly similar is the purpose of the Hitler party and in a thousand ways it has been and is being expressed. It was briefly and completely stated on August 22, 1931, by Count Reventlow, a Hitlerite member of the Reichstag, speaking in Koenigsberg: "It is our duty to exterminate the Jew."

Haman's anti-Jewish policy had to be "sold" to an unwilling king . . . "And Haman said unto king Ahaseurus, "There is a certain people scattered abroad and dispersed among the people in all the provinces of thy kingdom; and their laws are diverse from all people; neither keep they the king's laws; therefore it is not for the king's profit to suffer them. If it please the king, let it be written that they may be destroyed'."

Almost like an echo across the ages comes the voice of Hitler in a proclamation: "He (the Jew) does not fit amongst us. He lives according to different inner and outer laws from ours... It is to him we owe it that we are today the pariah of the whole world."

And the voice of the Reichstag member Mutschmann adds: "Sometimes everything will be settled and avenged. Then synagogues will go up in smoke, for the struggle of decades shall not have been in vain, the day of reckoning (Continued on Page 4)

"My dear Rabbi Brickner: I am a Methodist minister and a regular listener to your messages from WHK, and I want to express my deep appreciation to you for these stimulating, thought provoking lectures on the live issues of the day. There is no man on the air from whom I receive more real blessing and uplift than from you.

Keep right on with these messages for they are sadly needed. If we had more men on the air giving similar leadership —men who can speak out—without soft pedaling, I feel sure that this nation would experience a new birth and see the dawn of a new day in our individual, social and national life.

The people of this country are sick and tired of the old order—the old way of doing things—they are indeed yearning for a new deal on all lines.

The millions who have this deep yearning for a new deal have faith in your messages, for they go to the heart of things, like the knife of the surgeon.

People by the thousands are with you in this, and I find that people in the section where I live and ministers listen eagerly to your message, and pray for the realization of the things of which you speak, especially in relation to a new social order.

We all thank you and our prayer is 'That Jehovah will strengthen and bless you in this great work.'

This is indeed my prayer and that of countless thousands who appreciate your leadership."

is coming."

Only at the point of technique do Hitler and Haman part. The barbarian Haman knew only the sword as an instrument of destruction; the barbarian Hitler, tutored in modern ways of a social destruction, proposes to use those economic instruments by which peoples are crushed.

How far will the analogy go? The destruction of the Jews was averted by Esther and the tables turned against Haman and the gallows that Haman had made ready for Mordecai became the instrument of Haman's own execution ... "Then the king said, 'Hang him thereon.' So they hanged Haman on the gallows that he had prepared for Mordecai. Then was the king's wrath pacified."
