The traditional Kol Nidre will be rendered at the opening of the evening service. Doors will be closed at 7:45 and no one will be admitted until after the conclusion of the Kol Nidre. Members are therefore urged to come early in order not to miss this very beautiful and inspiring opening to the service.

RABBI BRICKNER will officiate in the Temple in the evening and in the Auditorium the following morning, after which he will again return to the Temple. RABBI ROSENZWEIG will alternate with RABBI BRICKNER.

Special attention is directed to Recess, which occurs in both Temple and Auditorium. Services in Auditorium are resumed simultaneously with Children's Service in Temple. At conclusion of Children's service, ten minutes will be allowed for reseating in both Temple and Auditorium. At conclusion of Afternoon Service, five minutes will be allowed for reseating in both Temple and Auditorium before Memorial Service begins. No admission after beginning of Memorial Service.

For Children's Service in Temple all seats will be reserved for children, their parents and guardians. During this service others will be accommodated at the services in Auditorium.

The Congregation is requested to remain in the Temple and Auditorium to the end of the Closing Service which follows directly after the Memorial Service.

Frances Shapiro, who is only 14, has been playing the violin since she was six years old. Her precocious playing has developed rapidly and has attracted wide attention. Last June the Cleveland Symphony Orchestra invited her to play with them. She received an ovation and she was forced to give three encores.

Gene Rose is only 15 years old. He is one of the youngest members of the active associate group of the Fortnightly Club. Recently when Steinway Hall was opened at Halle's, he was invited to be the piano soloist. He has played at many recitals and has attracted wide notice because of his brilliant performance. He has won many prizes, the first one when he was ten years old. His repertoire includes both modern and classical compositions.

With two such artists the Sisterhood looks forward to an inspiring afternoon.

12 Christians Cited for Aid to Jews

Six Americans are among twelve men chosen by Jewish newspaper editors as the greatest Christian champions of the Jewish people during the last year. The result of the nation-wide poll, embracing forty-three Jewish newspapers, was made public by **Joseph Brainin**, editor of the **Seven Arts Feature Syndicate**.

The twelve outstanding Christians, who, in the opinion of the editors, have most vigorously supported Jewish political and civic rights and who have been the most outstanding in their opposition to anti-Semitism during the Jewish year 5693 were:

Michael Williams, American Catholic layman and editor of *The Commonweal*.

Sir Eric Drummond, former Secretary-General of the League of Nations.

Sir Arthur Wauchope, High Commissioner of Palestine.

Premier Benito Mussolini of Italy.

Dr. Thomas Masaryk, President of Czechoslovakia.

Camille Chautemps, French Minister of the Interior.

United States Senator Joseph T. Robinson of Arkansas.

The Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman, former president of the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America.

John Haynes Holmes, pastor of the Community Church, New York City.

H. R. Knickerbocker, foreign correspondent of *The New York Evening Post*.

Sir John Simon, Foreign Minister of Great Britain.

The Rev. Everett Clinchy, director of the National Conference of Jews and Christians.

Why They Were Chosen

In their answer to the questionnaire the editors gave the following reasons for their selections:

Mr. Williams—For taking the initiative in creating an international emergency committee for the emigration of German Jews and German Christians of Jewish descent and combating Nazi denials that Jews had been killed, injured or were being discriminated against.

Sir Arthur Wauchope—For co-operating generously and effectively with Jewish efforts to rebuild Palestine.

Premier Mussolini—Because he took pains to demonstrate that Italian Fascism does not tolerate racial and religious persecution.

Sir Eric Drummond—Because, as Secretary General of the League of Nations, he brought the question of Nazi anti-Semitism before the League.

M. Chautemps—Because, as French Foreign Minister, he granted asylum to thousands of Jewish refugees from Germany.

Senator Robinson—For denouncing Hitlerite persecution of Jews on the floor of the Senate.

Dr. Cadman—For striving consistently for Christian-Jewish good-will in America and arousing Christians here to the persecution in Germany.

Mr. Holmes—For demanding that Christians formally disavow "the centuries-old libel that the Jews killed Christ."

Mr. Knickerbocker—For his newspaper articles describing conditions in Germany.

Sir John Simon—For assuming a sympathetic stand, as British Foreign Minister, toward the plight of the German-Jewish refugees.

Dr. Masaryk—For affording a refuge to Jews in Czechoslovakia and for his support of reconstruction work in Palestine.

Mr. Clinchy—For working for the elimination of anti-Jewish prejudice.
