14,905 Jews Enter Palestine

LONDON, Nov. 18—According to an official report issued here, 14,905 Jewish immigrants entered Palestine in the first eight months of 1933, as compared with 3,841 for 1932 and 3,049 in 1931. Since the end of the world war, 132,930 Jewish immigrants came into Palestine, the report disclosed.

Breaking a Glass at Wedding Ceremony

The reason for the breaking of the glass at the wedding ceremony, traditionally accepted and included in the books of law, connects the custom with an incident related in the Talmud. There it is related that at the wedding ceremony of a son of Mar, the son of Rabin, the guests became hilarious and unruly, whereupon Mar took out a fine glass, to the value of 400 zuzim, and broke it in their presence. The shock made them sober and more settled. Thus the custom arose of breaking a glass at every wedding so as to prevent excessive hilarity.

Later authorities added to this the symbolic idea of remembering the destruction of the Temple even at the height of the most joyous occasion, based on the verse in Psalms 137:6 (If I set not Jerusalem above my chiefest joy.) The idea of tempering the spirit of joy that is natural on such an occasion is present in several other ceremonies connected with the wedding.

Another, more poetic reason has been advanced for the custom. The glass is supposed to serve as the symbol of married life. Just as the glass is fragile and must be handled with tenderness and care lest it break, so also the happiness of the home should be guarded and watched over with extreme anxiety and devotion, inasmuch as the least friction might upset it irrevocably, even as the glass broken to pieces cannot be repaired again.—From the Jewish Exponent.
