BISHOP MANNING AND RABBI WISE IN NEW YORK CITY POLITICS

"Bishop William T. Manning, who had announced previously his support of the Fusion candidates, declared also, in a sermon at the Protestant Episcopal Cathedral of St. John the Divine, that it was the duty of the church to express itself on politics when such expression was part of a fight against misgovernment and corruption.

"The dominant issue in tomorrow's election, he said, is whether the city shall be rid of "the corrupting influence of partisan politics." He did not repeat his endorsement of any particular candidate, but declared the plea of keeping the church out of politics must be used "to excuse the church for standing silent in the presence of open corruption and wrong-doing."

"If honesty in public office and the integrity of our courts, and justice for the poor and defenseless, and the right use of public funds so that we may have the means to relieve the unemployed and their families in their distress—if these things have any moral value or importance, this is the time for all the forces of religion and righteousness to speak and make their influence felt.

"The issue before us in this election affects the life, both physical and spiritual, of every man, woman and child in this city, more especially the poorer people, and it goes beyond this, for dishonesty and corruption in our cities, if it is not checked, will send its moral poison through all the arteries of our national life.

The Foreign Affairs Council is a Cleveland organization of men and women engaged in presenting an educational program which will help in creating an enlightened public opinion on international problems.

PROFESSOR DIESENDRUCK TO CONDUCT AN INSTITUTE

Professor Zevi Diesendruck, head of the Department of Philosophy of the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati, will conduct an institute under the auspices of the Cleveland Zionist District in the Lake Room of Hotel Statler, on Sunday afternoon, December 3.

Professor Diesendruck will speak on "A. D. Gordon, the Philosopher of Labor." Professor Diesendruck is one of the world's outstanding Plato authorities. He has translated the works of this great Greek philosopher into Hebrew, and has also made original contributions in the field of philosophy, in Hebrew and German. He was formerly connected with the University of Vienna, Breslau, and was visiting professor of the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. The subject Professor Diesendruck will discuss here, will present the unique and ideal personality of A. D. Gordon, who came to Palestine and created the philosophy of Jewish labor.

"Leaving aside all question of personalities, the one real issue which now confronts us is whether we shall rid our city government of the corrupting influence of partisan politics, whether our city government shall continue to be run for the benefit of some political machine or whether it shall be run for the benefit of the people of this community.

"Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, in a sermon at the Free Synagogue, Carnegie Hall, praised F. H. LaGuardia as the outstanding candidate for Mayor, and said the election of the entire Fusion ticket would give Mr. LaGuardia support in his administration. He declared it "infinitely regrettable" that racial issues had been brought into the campaign.

"I am not particularly interested," he said, "in what McKee thinks of the Free Synagogue or LaGuardia of Zionism."

TEMPLE AT PEAK OF MEMBERSHIP

(Report of Cleveland Plain Dealer, Nov. 27)

"Nearly 500 men and women last night braved the driving snow to attend the 87th congregational meeting of Euclid Avenue Temple and hear reports that showed the congregation to be larger than at any previous time in its history and that the Temple was free of indebtedness.

"The membership of the congregation is 1,243 heads of families, representing more than 5,000 persons, according to the annual report of Irwin Loeser, Temple president. More than 5,000 cross the threshold of the Temple every week to attend religious services and other activities, he said. The budget for the year was reported as \$53,000.

"Former Common Pleas Judge Maurice Bernon, chairman of the religious school committee, reported that 898 children were enrolled in the required classes, while 550 attended an additional day a week for club activities and cultural purposes.

The Jews of America have a great deal to be thankful for at this Thanksgiving season, Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner told the congregation. Hitlerism may come to America, but America will never come to Hitlerism, he said.

"Officers will be elected by the board December 11."
