#### A SYMBOLISM OF OUR OWN

There are Jews who say: "Christmas is, after all, a beautiful idea. We regard it as a sentimental, not a religious occasion. We cherish its poetic symbolism and we consider the Christmas tree in that light."

To such Jews we commend the symbolism of Chanukah, the poetry of its candles, the generosity of its gifts. Do we need to borrow the neighbor's symbols when we are so rich in our own?

What is more beautiful than the timeless story which the Chanukah lights celebrate? It is a combination of the historical and the mystical. Its history has to do with the courage of the conscience which laid down life for its rights; its mysticism relates to the legend of the temple lamp which miraculously burned eight days after the rededication.

What inspiration for childhood in the story of our heroes who fought for no aggrandizement of their own but only for the perpetuation of the Holy Law, who died that this faith might be handed to us.

What poetry in the candle service . . "Blessed art Thou, O Lord our God, King of the universe, who has kept us in life and has preserved us and enabled us to reach this season . . . who wroughtest miracles for our fathers in days of old, at this season."

In what historic background stands today's child, luminous in the candle light, as his father recites his gratitude for his immortal life as a Jew.

Aye, these candle lights of his child-hood are among the things that guide a Jew's feet back when he wanders. They are of the sacred memories that never permit him to forget where he belongs. He has carried them in his heart and they summon him back.

What will our children have to remind them if we do not give these lights to their hearts?

Kindle the Chanukah lights every evening beginning with Tuesday evening, December 12th. Add one candle each night through Tuesday evening, December 19th when all eight candles are lighted. (See Union Prayer Book, page 351).

Sing the Chanukah songs which your child has learned in the Religious School.

Arrange for Chanukah parties.

Read the Chanukah story.
