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TO GET OURSELVES OFF OUR HANDS

In his story, called "A Raw Youth," Dostoevsky puts these profound words into the mouth of an old saint: "A man who bows down to nothing can never bear the burden of himself." God is not a luxury, he is a necessity. When man loses faith in God he worships humanity; when faith in humanity fails, he worships science, as so many are trying to do today. When faith in science fails man worships himself, and at the altar of his own idolatry he receives a benediction of vanity. Hence the tedious egotism of our day, when men are self-centered and self-obsessed, unable to get themselves off their hands. Only God, the eternal Other, is equal to the need of the human soul. Dostoevsky himself found liberty at last, in a final prostration of his soul, stripped and humbled, before God.

FROM PLATFORM OF WORLD ALLIANCE FOR INTERNATIONAL FRIENDSHIP

"The recommendation for a consultative pact was contained in the Alliance platform for the coming year, prepared by a committee headed by Dean Luther A. Weigle, of the Yale Divinity School, and adopted unanimously by the goodwill congress at its closing session here. The Alliance advocated international control of arms manufacture and sale. opposed compulsory military training in college and universities, demanded just treatment of minorities, called for an increasing share for the worker in the product of his industry and assailed extreme nationalism which it described as "a pathological form of patriotism."

"We urge that our own nation as well as all other nations recognize that ultimately, in the interests of peace, the arms and armaments of the nations shall be reduced to the level of police forces for the maintenance of peace and order within their own borders, relying upon international machinery for defense against external aggression."

"The world alliance believes," the platform continued, "that the manufacture, sale and transportation of arms and munitions should be taken out of the hands of private individuals or corporations and carried on only by government agencies under international control.

"We urge," it went on, "that the United States at once and completely apply in its immigration regulations the principle of racial equality, because friendly co-operation between nations can be established only on a foundation in which racial discrimination has no part.

"The "denial of liberty and withholding of common rights to racial and religious minorities in various countries" were characterized by the platform as "among the most disturbing factors in international relations.

"Whatever theory may be held in regard to the state it must not be forgotten that the individual has rights which the State may not justly abrogate and which are greater than the State and transcend ethical barriers," it continued.

"The just treatment of minorities is not only grounded in the future of civilization, but fundamental to all religion. Human conscience must not be coerced by State decrease. The just treatment of all groups, races and creeds is necessary to the health of the State itself. The recognition of the brotherhood of man, a wholesome ideal for the State, is essential to the more expansive ideal of equality for all States.

"After "confessing" that this nation had fallen short of the ideal, the platform dealt specifically with the situation in Germany, saying: "The recent persecution and ostracism of Jews in Germany afford ample evidence that even in this year of enlightment the struggle for religious liberty and social and economic freedom must be renewed and intensified."
