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THE WILL TO LIVE-OR DIE

From time to time news has filtered through of suicides among outstanding German Jews. Last month, the Manchester Guardian published a list of more than thirty names, many of them having been persons of note in the academic or artistic world. But the toll of self-destruction in the rank and file of German Jewry may be only surmised. Certain it is that the Jews are inured to suffering; through long centuries they have met persecution and adversity with foritude. Yet many cannot bear the burden of woe that has overtaken them under the Nazi thrall.

In a newly published work, "To Be or Not to Be," Dr. Louis I. Dublin devotes a chapter to the historical bearings of suicide among the Jews. He quotes with approval the statement of William James that "sufferings and hardships do not, as a rule, abate the love of life; they seem, on the contrary, usually to give it a keener zest. The sovereign source of melancholy is repletion. Need and struggle are what excite and inspire us; our hour of triumph is what brings the void. Not the Jews of the captivity, but those of the days of Solomon's glory are those from whom the pessimistic utterances in our Bible come."

Pious Jews have always regarded life as sacred and suicide as a transgression. Nevertheless, four instances of self-destruction are found in the Old Testament. In medieval times, under the hideous intensity of persecution, there were frequent instances of taking one's own life among the Jews. Dr. Dublin tells us that during recent decades in some cities in Russia, Galicia and Roumania, more than ten years often passed with-

out a single Jew taking his own life.

The picture, however, in contemporary western Europe has been different. "In Germany," we are told, "during the 19th century suicide rates among the Jews increased more than in other denominations. In Bavaria there was a 200 per cent increase in 55 years, and in Prussia a nine-fold increase between 1849 and 1923. In late years the rate has been even higher among German Jews than among Protestants and four times as high as among Catholics." The author of this study ascribes as one of the reasons for this increase "the demoralizing effect of anti-Semitism."

No one can estimate the devastating psychic effects on people hounded as the Jews are now in Germany. Not only loss of livelihood or bankruptcy or detention in concentration camps or personal violence or forced exile are the results. Shattered nerves, disillusion, hopelessness, also work their havoc. Suicide among Jews of Germany today threatens to become a major problem. Where physical salvage is not in sight and there is a loss of spiritual anchorage, this is not to be wondered at. And it is a sad fact that it is not by any means the weaklings who go under in this impulse to self-destruction; often the ablest minds are unable to withstand the wrench that comes with wrecked lives.

HOLD INSTITUTE ON JUDAISM

The program is as follows:

Monday morning at 10:30 o'clock, Dr. Julian Morgenstern, President of the Hebrew Union College of Cincinnati and a former President of the American Oriental Society will speak on "The Rise of Judaism."

Luncheon will be served by he Sisterhood at 12:15 o'clock and the Ministers of Cleveland will be the guests of the temple at luncheon.

The afternoon session will commence at 1:45 o'clock. Dr. Israel Bettan, Professor of Midrash and Homiletics at the Hebrew Union College will read a paper on "The Rise of the Sermon in the Synagogue" in which he will deal with the development of worship, prayer, synagogual service and the sermon.

At 3:30 oclock, Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner will speak on "The Jews in This Changing Civilization." He will discuss the contemporary Jewish scene the world over and the specific problems facing our people.

The Ministerial Association has a membership of over three hundred and it is expected that a majority of its members will attend.

All the sessions will be held at the Euclid Avenue Temple.
