INSTITUTE ON JUDAISM IS HUGE SUCCESS

Two hundred and thirty rabbis, Christian ministers and priests assembled as guests of Euclid Avenue Temple and Rabbi Barnett R. Brickner yesterday for the first Institute on Judaism ever held in Cleveland.

The institute, an all day program arranged by Rabbi Brickner and Dr. Arthur J. Cullen, president of the Cleveland Ministers Union, presented addresses on Jewish life and history, use of the sermon in religious worship and the promotion of better understanding between Christian and Jew by Dr. Julian Morgenstern, president, and Dr. Israel Bettan, professor of homiletics at Hebrew Union College, Cincinnati, and by the host rabbi.

Dr. Morgenstern traced the evolution of Judaism as a national religion and the successive steps as manifested in the writings of the Exilic prophets by which the concept of universalism evolved and became concrete.

Explains Problems

He credited the rise of Judaism as a religion to the later prophecy of Jeremiah, who conceived of the Jewish captivity and sufferings in exile as a disciplinary measure on the part of Jehovah, who would later restore His people to their land and nation. This, he asserted, opened up for the people an entirely new vista of hope, yearning and inspiration.

vice of the ancient synagogue in which the prophets of Israel voiced their messages of truth and admonition.

"The Jew is a sensitive barometer to the world situation, said Rabbi Brickner in the concluding address, which dealt with the Jew in the modern world.

"The tragedy of the Jew is that he is regarded as an alien in many countries, as a guest in a few and at home in still fewer," he said.

Urges Three-Fold Plan

"There are three ways to mitigate anti-Semitism in the world: The Christian world should try to abandon the idea that the Jews killed Jesus; we should try to abandon the idea of the racial and nationalistic state; we will have to become economically internationalminded because in the exclusively national economic crisis the tendency is to find a scapegoat, most likely to be the Jew, the Negro or the foreigner."

The ministers were the guests of Euclid Avenue Temple for luncheon. Rev. Michael L. Moriarity, director of the Catholic charities conducted the devotional service opening the institute.
