FOREIGN AFFAIRS HOLDS INSTITUTE

This year the Foreign Affairs Council and more than twenty civic and educational groups are sponsoring an institute on Friday and Saturday, March 30 and 31. The subject chosen, "A New Deal in the United States' Foreign Policy," is a particularly timely topic.

The opening session will be in Allen Memorial Library on Friday, March 30, at 8:00 p. m. Charles Warren, a nationally known lawyer who is in the State Department in Washington, talks on "Troubles of a Neutral—or How to Try to Keep Out of War"; Ernest Gruening, one of the editors of The Nation who accompanied Cordell Hull to the Montevideo Conference, on "The New Deal in Latin American Policy"; Hon. Newton D. Baker on "Will Reorganization Save the League of Nations."

At 10:00 a. m. on Saturday morning group discussions will be held in Cleveland College with Professor Jacob C. Meyer of Western Reserve University, F. H. Sterbenz, Foreign Affairs editor of The Cleveland Press, and S. Burns Weston, attorney, leading the discussions.

Frank H. Simonds, writer and authority on international problems, will discuss "The Next European War—Can We Keep Out of It?" at the luncheon which

will be held in Hotel Cleveland at 12:15 p. m.

A round table discussion is scheduled at 2:30 under the leadership of Henry M. Busch, Assistant Director of Cleveland College. The principal speakers, local business men whose firms have trade relations with Europe and South and Central America, and other informed citizens will discuss the various phases of changes in the U. S. foreign policy under the Roosevelt administration.

All these meetings are open to the public.
