#### BUREAU LIGHTS TENTH CANDLE

The tenth birthday of the Cleveland Bureau of Jewish Education will be celebrated on Sunday evening, November 11th, with a dinner at the Oakwood Club.

The Bureau of Jewish Education, in the decade of its existence, has contributed to the educational life of the community in many ways. It maintains six Hebrew schools which have an enrollment of 1100, the Council Religious Schools with an enrollment of over one thousand, a Council Religious High School, a Hebrew High School, a Hebrew Teachers' Training School, the Cleveland Institute of Jewish Studies with an enrollment of over 200 adults, including a Religious Teachers' Training department and a department for the training of club leaders.

The Extension Department of the Bureau has organized a League of Jewish Youth consisting of 63 Jewish youth organizations with a corporate membership of over four thousand young people.

for the purpose of coordinating their social and cultural activities and imbuing them with Jewish interest and a Jewish community consciousness. The Bureau also supervises the activities of the twenty Young Judaea groups which have an enrollment of about 300 children.

The Extension Department of the Bureau also sponsors holiday radio programs reaching thousands of unaffiliated Jewish families.

The educational material issued by the publication department of the Bureau are used not only in every Jewish educational institution in the city but in many Jewish communities throughout the country. During the last two years, no less than 60,000 copies of its publications have been sold. In our community, the office of the Bureau serves as a clearing house for all educational matters and problems.

# RABBIS BRICKNER AND HELLER IN SYMPOSIUM

Brickner of the Euclid Avenue Temple, and Mr. Morris Rothenberg, of New York, President of the Zionist Organization of America, will participate in the symposium.

On Sunday afternoon, Mr. A. H. Friedland, Director of the Cleveland Bureau of Jewish Education, will address the conference. The subject of his address will be "Cultural Achievements of the New Palestine."

### JEWS SUE TO HALT NAZI PROPAGANDA

Seek to Prove Falsity of Charges Israel Seeks World Domination

BERNE, Switzerland, Oct. 28.—(AP)
—A lawsuit opens here tomorrow in
which Jewish leaders hope to prove to
the world the alleged falsity of documents painting Israel as seeking to dominate all the races of the earth.

It is hoped to establish that these documents, known as the "Proctocols of the Elders of Zion," depicting Jewry as seeking world hegemony, are forged and false.

The Swiss Nazi party, with Chancellor Adolf Hitler in the background as the driving force, is alleged to have deliberately plagiarized a famous French essay written in the epoch of Napoleon

to prove that Jewry had vast ambitions.

These documents, it is alleged have gained world-wide distribution, and in them the Nazis have twisted the "yellow peril," watchword of the former kaiser, into the "Jewish peril."

During the world Jewish conference at Geneva last August, rumors that Jewry sought to create a super-government were stigmatized as outrageous by Rabbi Wise of New York, who compared the rumors to the falsity of the notorious 'Protocols of the Elders of Zion."

The allegedly spurious protocols form the basis of the present lawsuit.

The Union of Jewish Communities in Switzerland and the Jewish community of Berne lodged a civil complaint against the leaders of the Swiss Nazis and others. They demand confiscation of a pamphlet and especially of the "protocols" as being in violation of the Swiss law prohibiting the printing of trashy literature "calculated to excite vile instincts or to cause brutal offense."

The plaintiffs claim the publications are plagiarisms of the "Dialog in Hades Between Machiavelli and Montesquieu," written in 1864 by the French lawyer Maurice Joly against the dictatorship of Napoleon III.

The pretended secrets of the elders of Zion were first published in 1905 in the Russian language by one Nilus.

The Jewish leaders claim the differences in the texts of Joly's Essays and the fiery Zionist "protocols" are of the slightest. They also assert that plagiarists substituted the Jewish elders for Machiavel, who speaks in the name of Napoleon.

In his original essay Joly, through the voice of Montesquieu, great French philosopher and contemporary of Jean Jacques Rousseau, defends an oppressed people against the despotism of Napoleon, who in the protested publications is transformed into the Jewish elders.

#### YOUR HELP IS NEEDED

The Cuyahoga County Commissioners and the Officers of the Community Fund both are asking the fullest cooperation of every citizen and contributor in the measures by which the Welfare needs of this County may be more adequately met in 1935.

Because of a minimum need of \$6,500,000 by the County itself for Welfare purposes, a Special Levy of 4.5 Mills is being submitted to the voters at the forthcoming election on November 6th.

#### Here are the Facts:

The County has both a legal and a moral obligation to meet. It must care for fatherless and neglected children, it must extend relief to the victims of tuberculosis, it must aid the indigent sick who are unable to pay hospital bills, it must provide for the families of indigent soldiers and sailors who are honorably discharged and it must care for the insane. These are all required by law and the passage of this special levy for the funds required is essential for the well-being of the entire community.

While the Community Fund will continue to care for many of those in need, the greater part of the funds required for the gigantic task ahead of us this winter MUST come from the poor relief levy. While Federal and State funds are being supplied in large sums for unemployment relief, not one cent of such funds may be used for the County statutory purposes budgeted hert. In fact the County must provide \$310,200 from this levy for family and emergency relief to supplement federal and state funds.

Your vote and the votes of every member of your family and friends are needed "FOR" the poor relief and welfare levy. Everyone must help because this is a community situation in which everyone has a part.
