TO THE JEWISH CONTRIBUTORS OF THE CLEVELAND COMMUNITY FUND:

During the past four years of this depression, we have all had to practice economies in our daily living and spending.

Fortunately for many of us, the exercise of these economies has not meant any deprivation to either our families or ourselves.

To the extent, however, that we have cut our contributions to the Community Fund, or not given as freely as we might. we have forced great suffering upon thousands of unfortunate people, most of whom have never before known want or suffering.

In a period when the need for our help has been steadily growing a continuance of inadequate giving necessarily results in jeopardy to the health and morale of our whole community life.

The time has come when those of us who have been more fortunate, must do more. Necessary treatment for the indigent sick must not be postponed. Proper care of dependent children must no longer be curtailed. We cannot allow a vast army of disillusioned, unemployed young men and women to lose faith completely.

During the week of November 19th you will be asked to make your annual pledge to the Community Fund with its ninety odd Welfare Institutions; \$3,000,-000 was subscribed for 1930; \$3,500,000 has been set as the Goal for 1935.

And with our failure to pass the 4.5 Mill Welfare Levy in the last election, more is needed because such institutions as Mount Sinai Hospital and the Welfare Association for Jewish Children expected the Tax support on which they have relied in large measure, to be continued.

The money must come from one source or another—if not from Taxation then from our Private Contributions. Please bear this in mind. More is being asked of you because more is needed.

BOOK REVIEW

THE HASIDIC ANTHOLOGY. Translated from the Hebrew, Yiddish and German, and selected, compiled and arranged by Louis I. Newman.

Answering to some inward need in the Jewish people, the Hasidim, sprang into existence during the middle of the eighteenth century in Podolia, and, spreading like wildfire, infected at least half of the Russian and Polish Jewry. This remarkable mystic cult, originating with the appearance of the miracleworker Baal Shem, also known as Besht and the Master of the Name, under which title Israel Zangwill devoted a study to him in "Dreamers of the Ghetto," placed spirit above dogma, emotion above intellect, and exultation above cold formalities and knowledge. The rise of this cult, which continues its existence to this day, though not with the original fervor, is one of the extraordinary phenomena of history, and in its more active days gave the long-repressed energies of the ghetto-bound Jews an outlet for bodily and spiritual ectasy.

The exceptional men of this cult, its leaders, were called the Zaddikim "Righteous Men," who employed their gifts in exultant living—'walking on air," as it were; and it did not enter their minds that they ought to leave to posterity anything but the tradition and the impulse to do likewise. They left but few books behind. The whole Hasidic literature developed by being passed from tongue to tongue, from generation to generation, and even where a saying or a parable is assigned to this or that Zaddik no one can actually give proof of the author's identity. It has all been like the growth of legend and myth, and has all the essential popular truth that legend and myth have.

A considerable literature has grown up around the Hasidic movement. Rabbi Newman's immense anthology, the first book of its kind in English, presents many aspects of it. It is not possible within the scope of a review to give even a faint idea of the variety of subjects treated in these seven hundred-odd pages. The compiler has arranged the themes under 205 headings, which cover thousands of parables, folk tales, fables, aphorisms, epigrams, sayings, anecdotes, proverbs and exceptical interpretations of the Hasidic masters and disciples, and their lore and wisdom.
